DIED.

BARZEE—At the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. Selgmund, on Lee street, at 2 p. m., Thursday, February 27, 1908, of old age, Clark Barzee, aged 79.

Clark Barzee was one of the pioneers of the Willamette valley, coming here in 1861. At that time he was located on a farm about eight miles south of the city, where he remained until his wife died about three years ago. Since that time he has been living with his children in this city and elsewhere. Eleven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Barzee, ten of whom are living. There are two in this city, Mrs. Selgmund, 500 Lee street, and Mrs. B. B. Herick, wife of the county surveyor. There are three in Portland, three in Eastern Oregon, one at Coos Bay and one at Farmington, Wash.

The deceased had been gradually failing for some time, and the end came peacefully Thursday afternoon. The funeral will be held about 11 o'clock Saturday morning at Turney and the body will be laid to rest in Twin Oak cemetery. It is not known how many of the children will be able to get here, but probably nearly all.

Deceased was a well-known farmer and hop raiser, who came to Salem four years ago. He leaves a wife and three children. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, and a man of fine character.
