The Railroad Commission has issued instructions to agents providing for reparation to be made to shippers, who, by accident or oversight, have been overcharged on interstate shipments. By these instructions, railroads can secure permission from the commission to charge lower rates to such shippers as have been injured by overcharge, but the rate which is afterward given the shipper in reparation must be maintained for six months.
