### FOLSOM GETS A DELAY

and his attorney, Peter D'Arcy, and Judge Moores, the case was continued until next Tuesday at 2 o'clock, when Folsom will enter his plea.

Considerable difficulty was experienced by the prosecution as to what charge should be preferred against Folsom, Chief of Police Gibson preferring that he should be tried under the state law, a violation of which is punishable by a maximum imprisonment of five years in the penitentiary, and a much higher fine than the city vagrant law, the highest penalty of which is but 20 days in the county jail or by \$100 fine. Assistant District Attorney C. H. McNary, however, was of the opinion that it would not be possible to convict Folsom under the state law, and advised Chief of Police Gibson that he had better proceed under the vagrant law, under the provisions of which he had almost a sure case against Folsom. Accordingly, Gibson swore to a complaint charging Folsom with vagrancy.

"I did not bargain on going to Mattewan," Thaw declared. "Not one of the lawyers in my case will get a cent from me until they get me out of this asylum. I bargained to be acquitted, not to be sent to an asylum for the criminal insane."

## PERUVIAN WARSHIPS SALUTE

Grand Procession of American Battleships as They Pass Out of Callao Harbor.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Callao, Peru, Feb. 29.—Saluted by the guns of the Peruvian warships as they passed out of the harbor and given a hearty bon voyage by the thousands of people on pleasure craft and ashore, the American battleship fleet, led by the flagship Connecticut, steamed out of the harbor this morning for Magdalena bay. The stately procession of warships presented a magnificent sight as they passed out in single file. The Peruvian ships acted as escort, accompanying the American vessels several miles outside of the harbor.

Henry Reuterdahl's departure from the fleet is causing much comment among Peruvian naval officers. Having discussed Reuterdahl's criticisms with American officers, many are inclined to the belief that Reuterdahl left the fleet because he felt that he was persona non grata.

Before sailing, Rear-Admiral Evans sent messages to President Pardo and the minister of marine thanking them for the cordiality of the reception and treatment tendered the officers and men under his command.

The admiral's condition showed slight improvement this morning.

The two crooks in the past six weeks have committed many daring crimes, and have completely baffled the police who are as much at sea as they were when the notorious "gas-pipe thugs" were terrorizing the city.
