ATTELL DEFEATS KELLY

Eastern Youth Was Not Able to Stand Before the Western Featherweight Champion.

San Francisco, Feb. 29.—The defeat of Eddie Kelly by Abe Attell last night was not unexpected, despite the desperate efforts of the press agents to make it appear that the Easterner is a most dangerous man and had a good chance of taking the championship back to Buffalo. As a matter of fact, Kelly has little more than a good set of muscles and a pug nose to recommend him as a fighter. Before the fight there were rumors of a "frame-up" and the promoters wanted the bets called off, but this the referee refused to do, contenting himself by giving the fight a warning.

Attell found no difficulty in defending his title. It was evident from the start that he was the master of the youngster before him, and the outcome was never in doubt.

When they came up for the seventh round it was evident that Attell was ready to win, as he dropped his boxing tactics and started to fight in earnest. He opened with a couple of hard rights to the head and followed with right and left to the head. Kelly went down from a hard right to the jaw. He staggered to his feet, only to get another right and left to the jaw, which sent him down again. He was up and at Attell again, only to be knocked down for the third time.

The full ten seconds had just been tolled off when the police jumped into the ring and ordered the fight stopped.

NEW CHINESE CONSUL SENT TO 'FRISCO.

San Francisco, Feb. 29.—With the coming of his brother, Kee Owyang, who arrived yesterday on the liner Siberia, Owyang King, who has been Chinese consul general in San Francisco since the early eighties, has been relieved of active charge of the affairs of the consulate, and after a trip through the eastern part of the United States, will return to China.

Owyang King will not be officially relieved until the arrival of the new consul general, Ping Chun, who is expected in about a month. Owyang's brother, has been appointed vice consul, will at once begin his duties at the consulate.

Now is the Time to Prune Your Trees.

A prominent horticulturist has the following to say, and the advice should be taken:

"This is the time of the year for people to prune their trees and get ready for spraying," said Mr. Whitney. Care should be taken by them, however, not to cut the tops of the trees. Doing this only produces a bush top. The tree makes a lot of shade and wood but they do not bear fruit when they are cut from the top.

"The limbs should be thinned out so as to let the sun and air through the branches. Those limbs that cross and interfere with one another must be cut away. To complete the job the trees should be balanced up properly so that it does not present a lopsided appearance.

"In the process of pruning sometimes as much as a third of a tree is cut away. This of course, reduces the expense of spraying that much. It also admits a more thorough job.

"People in the country I find are taking a much greater interest than usual. Most of the fruit trees are well attended to and the best and

intest methods of caring for them are being sought. The Walla Walla and Umatilla county inspectors are working together. We recognize the fact that it is necessary since the bugs do not recognize any such thing in their incursions as a state line."
