The Interstate Commerce Commission today decided there was good reason why the railroads of the country should not have a sufficient number of telegraphers on hand to supply the increased demand made by the new law. The statute goes into effect Wednesday, and it will compel every railroad in the country to limit the hours of telegraphers and train dispatchers to nine hours each day. The roads combined, and, after fighting the law in every possible manner, made an application for more time. This extension was flatly denied.

ANARCHISTS STABBED SHIPPY

(Continued from First Page.)
Shippy's son opened the door. He handed the chief a letter and as Shippy started to open it the Italian assassin drew a 38-calibre revolver and aimed it at the two occupants of the room.

Harry Shippy a Hero.

Harry Shippy stepped forward to save his father's life as he screamed. Harry received the bullet in the shoulder, but continued to fight with the man, who then fell on the left lung.
The boy fell to the floor the assassin aimed at Shippy with a revolver, which he whipped out of his pocket. Driver Foley, who had just entered an adjoining room, rushed in and shot the man. The assassin was shot in the chest, and his revolver was shattered by the bullet.

Shippy Fought the Demon.

Chief Shippy wrestled with the demon, the driver picked up his revolver with the other hand and aimed a furious blow at the assassin's head. The chief dodged and

received the blow on the right arm. An artery was severed and he fell, weakened from loss of blood. As he staggered and attempted to arise the man fired another shot, which went wild. Shippy then fired directly at the man's head, and the assassin fell dead on the doorstep with a bullet in his brain.

Lieutenant Danner, and all the reserves from North Halsted street station, came running to the chief's residence and took charge of the wounded men, who were attended by a number of physicians, who had been attracted by the shots.

Was Black Hand Tool.

The identification of the dead assassin as a regular attendant at an anarchist's meeting here was obtained this afternoon. It is reported that he had been selected at a recent meeting to kill Chief Shippy and the mayor. Papers were found on him that may lead to his identity at Meadville, Pa.

Chicago Raiding the Reds.

The police have ordered the arrest of all anarchists and "black hand" suspects in Chicago. The initials "D. A." are on the dead man's underclothing, and the name "Lozenges, Meadville, Pennsylvania," was found upon a card in

a coat pocket. Shippy received two warning letters Saturday, Foley, the driver, may recover.

Ousting Anarchistic Groups.

The police anarchistic squad raided the headquarters of two West Side groups this afternoon, and confiscated their literature and records. It is expected that the police will get a full list of anarchists in the city.

Emma Goldman, who was slated to speak here next Saturday night, will not keep her engagement, for, by request of the police, the Hod Carriers' union agreed to cancel the meeting.

Marcola Hotel Burned.

Eugene, Or., March 2.—The hotel at Marcola, a town on the Mohawk branch of the Southern Pacific, 17 miles northeast of Eugene, was destroyed by fire this morning shortly after midnight. The fire started in an unoccupied room, and gained such headway that the guests had great difficulty in getting out. Many rushed out in the cold with no clothing on, and the citizens had to give them wearing apparel to prevent suffering. The town had no fire department, but a bucket brigade did effective work.

Germany Biting the Bear.

London, March 2.—Trouble between Russia and Germany is imminent over the rumored German demands resulting from the imprisonment and torture of Edward Levla, a German newspaper correspondent who is now in the Russian prison at Minsk. It is said Germany will demand his release, an indemnity and the punishment of his prosecutors.
