A final decision will be rendered on the matter after ten days.

TEACHER BECOMES A BIG HEIRESS

Medicine Bow, Wyo., Mar. 3.—Miss Ethel Sherar, the comely, young teacher of the only educational institution in the Medicine Bow district, says she has fallen heir to \$1,000,000. From the position of mistress of the little log schoolhouse of the toughest town in the Wyoming cattle country to that of mistress of a millionaire's palace in Portland, Or., is the step she is to take. Miss Sherar, who is 21 years of age, says she has been notified that through the will of an uncle, a wealthy Oregon lumberman, who died recently, she has inherited more than \$1,000,000. Miss Sherar's head has not been turned by her good fortune, and she announces that she will complete her term of school before going to Oregon to assume control of her property. She is an orphan and has earned her own living since she was a school girl, having taught school in Laramie before going to Medicine Bow.

It was at her unpretentious boarding house at Medicine Bow that the richest young woman in Wyoming was seen today—a dingy old wooden structure that must have been a feature of the straggling dried-up village when Owen Wister's "Virginians" came there to meet his fate in the eyes of "Molly." Miss Sherar herself is good-looking, a pronounced brunette, with prettily arched eyebrows and a wealth of coloring that is most unusual to see upon the plains. She is above the medium

height, with a good figure and a soft voice having almost a southern intonation.

Miss Sherar was born in Rochester, N. Y., and became an orphan at a very early age. She obtained an education at the Nazareth academy, and later graduated from the normal college at Rockport, New York. She came to Wyoming two years ago, and began to teach country schools for a living, attending the state university in the intervals of her work.

TAXES ROLLING IN AT A FURIOUS RATE

Marion county, according to the manner in which taxes are flowing into the coffers of the county treasury, has not only been unaffected by the recent panic, but money seems to be more plentiful than it was at this time last year. During the month of February, 1907, but \$4217.44 was collected in taxes, whereas, for this year for the same month, \$96,718.47 has been paid, nearly all taxpayers being financially able to pay and secure the rebate of 3 per cent.

It is estimated that before the 15th of March, the date on which the rebate privilege ceases, nearly one-half as much again as has been paid during February will be collected.

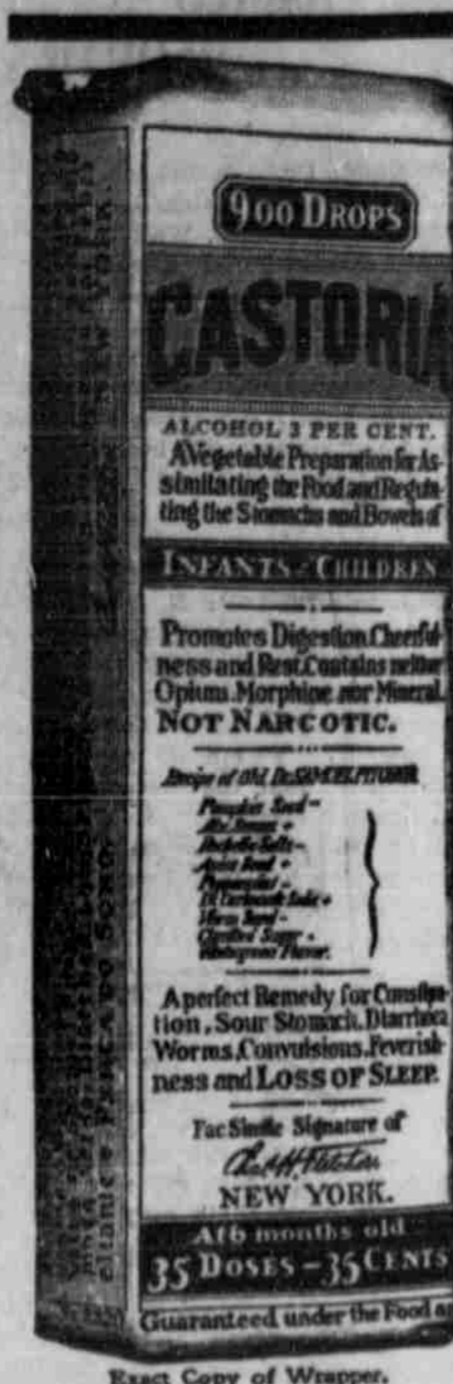

SENATOR HART ON NEW LAWS

Discusses Before Baker City Audience Some Proposed Laws.

Senate joint resolution No. 7 which proposes to revise the judiciary of the state was one of the subjects talked on. According to that measure the circuit court is to have charge of all probate matters which are now attended to by the county court. House joint resolution No. 7 provides for amending the constitution in such a manner that all state

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and county elections shall be held on the same day as the national election. Many have expressed a favorable view of this plan, for it is argued that as the matter now stands Oregon is elected to death, both in the way of time consumed and the cost in money for holding so many elections.

The rights of a district attorney are revised by the proposed amendment of section 18, article 7, providing that all persons accused of crime shall have the charges submitted to the grand jury, thus preventing the district attorney from filing information in the case.

One of the things which creates considerable comment in the house joint resolution amending section 28, article 4. The purpose of it is to increase the pay of legislators from \$3 a day to \$400 for each session. There are those who think the honor of serving in the legislature of any state should be sufficient compensation, and that money should not even be allowed for expenses. This class of voters is not nearly so large as it once was. Others argue that \$400 is not enough pay for the men who spend their time at Salem and neglect their own personal business. After the meeting one man remarked, "we should pay men enough salary for going to the legislature to keep them from having any desire to graft in order to meet their expense bills. I recall that one citizen said \$3 a day does not pay for a stenographer, and another who had spent two terms in the house said the pay was so small that he found it necessary to borrow a stenographer to do his work, from a wealthy

member who did not care for expenses."

The recall, as talked of a great deal, was explained by Senator Hart as a measure providing for 25 per cent of the legal voters demanding a recall of an officer, the question shall then be submitted to a special election held for that purpose and if a majority of the electors decide to have him recalled the officer shall forthwith be discharged.

It is needless to say that this is one measure opposed heartily by men who play politics for a living. The old time machine man, it is said, laughs at such an idea and swears it will never pass, while men who transact business and do not care a rap for the political organization are inclined to favor the plan.
