On Fair day, April 4, there will be all kinds of games and sports, music by the band and attractions of all kinds. The officers are looking forward to a big crowd. Definite announcements are not yet ready, but it is known that Lute Savage, an old-timer at the business, will have charge of the pony races. Competent men will have charge of the other attractions also.

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NAVY KNOCKERS ARE SILENCED.

Washington, March 3.—Testimony of a widely different character from that given yesterday was heard today by the senate investigation committee into the condition of the navy. Three witnesses were examined and their testimony largely discounted that of Sims, who drew such a gloomy picture yesterday.

The witnesses were Commander Fletcher, Lieutenant Commander Chase, Philip R. Alger, professor of mathematics in the naval academy, and Lieutenant Commander Strauss. They declared that the dangers from the direct ammunition hoists were being rapidly eliminated, and that the battleships were now being fitted with hoists as safe as those on any warship in the world. In regard to the gunnery at Santiago, the witnesses unanimously declared that it was very good. Since that date, they declared, marksmanship had improved in every navy in the world.

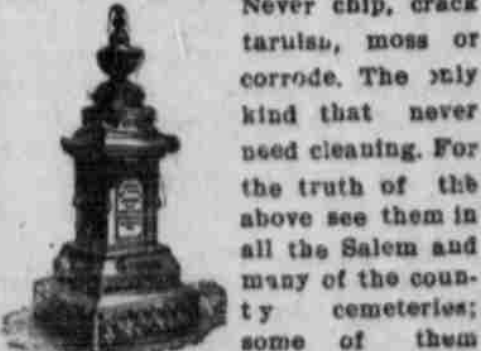
IS 80 YEARS OLD.
He was born in Perry, Ohio, March 2, 1829, of Irish ancestry. Educated in public schools Wooster academy and Allegheny college. Studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1851. Removed to Iowa in 1857, and made Dubuque his home. Was a delegate to the convention which nominated Lincoln in 1860. Served on the staff of Governor Kirkwood, of Iowa, during the Civil War.

Elected a member of the thirty-eighth congress in 1862. Re-elected to congress in 1864, 1866 and 1868. Elected to the United States senate in 1872 to succeed Senator James Harlan. Re-elected to the senate in 1878, 1884, 1890, 1896 and 1902. Present term in the senate will expire March 3, 1909.
