PROSECUTOR HENEY DID NOT MAKE GOOD

Editor Orville Dodge's Able Defense of Senator Fulton in the Coquille Sentinel.

The people of Coos county read with interest the attack which Francis J. Heney made upon Senator Fulton in an address in Portland recently, but they withheld their verdict until the senator had made a reply thereto; for they realized it was nothing more than a part of a political game gotten up in the interest of the opposition party, who would endeavor to cast the stigma of dishonor upon Mr. Fulton and lower his standing with the people, knowing this to be the only way, as they have for years had governmental spies on his track tracing his every move and were just as anxious to catch him in the snare as they were Senator Mitchell and others whom they indicted by one-sided testimony and convicted by the means of perjured testimony. Not finding anything against Fulton they had a writer of the American Magazine come into the state and after spending a few weeks with the enemies of the senator he wrote a series of articles for his publication on the work of Heney and Burns in Oregon which placed Mr. Fulton in the light of a scoundrel in the minds of those who believe everything they read, especially if it is against one who holds a position of trust and honor. We read the articles through several times, but it was only the testimony that was used in the trials in Portland, and did not contain anything which would make one change his mind and see the terrible crime that had been committed by C. W. Fulton.

It fully sets at rest the unwarranted attack made upon the gentleman by the prosecutor who obtained \$5000 from the federal government for doing their dirty work. Everyone is aware that it is an easy matter to have affidavits "manufactured" for a sum of money if it will help out a person in a political fight, and thinking people have very little faith in affidavits that are brought forth during a campaign. Mr. Fulton's letter is a manly one and should be read by everyone. He appeals to the people of Oregon to put their stamp of disapproval upon the work of the conspirators who are endeavoring to defeat him for re-election to the senate. The Sentinel believes Mr. Fulton is the best person the voters of Coos county can vote for for that office, as he has proven his worth in working for the best interest of the county and its people. To the people of the state he has been the best of servants, looking after their interests on all occasions, always being willing to go out of his way to help anyone who has in any way asked for his services. 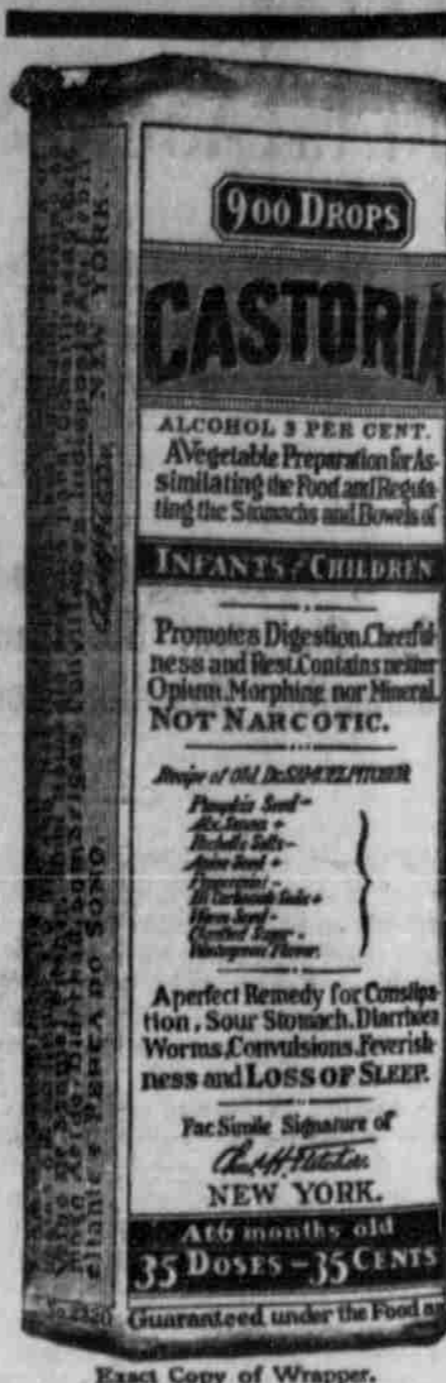
DEFENDS NORMAL SCHOOLS

Editor Hurley Takes Issue With the Beaver State Herald Man.

We do not believe our friend Brownhill of the Beaver Herald has given all sides of the higher education in this state thorough study. In answering our article of a few weeks ago he clings to the view that the university should supplant the normal schools excepting that at Weston. We believe this is not a desired move. Upon this principle one school is enough in eastern Oregon and one in the Willamette valley. Why not discard one of these then and thus have one institution of higher learning? Normal teachers supply a field distinct in itself and require special training. Place a normal course at the university and normal training becomes a side issue. The training of the mind for the highest education is the true work of a university. The training of teachers is the work of a normal school. They should be distinct. We should scatter our normal schools over the state because the section of the state nearest the school sends the young men and women just from high school to this school and they become teachers and teach. Send them to a university and they don't teach. This state can afford to support its university, its agricultural college, and its normal schools. There is a lesson to the Beaver Herald editor in the general distribution of the Catholic schools in Oregon. There are a number of these schools. I can, at this time call to mind about six of these schools, scattered judiciously over the state. These schools are recognized as the equal of any schools, in so far as the educational and accomplishments are concerned and the Catholic church, after years of experience in school matters finds it practical to scatter their schools generally over the states. If they can make a success of their schools, why can't the people make a success of their state schools? We are not contending that the university education is not the highest and best education a person can get but we do contend that the people get more direct benefit out of the money they expend for the normal schools than they do for all other schools of higher education combined. I believe in giving liberally to the university as it is our highest standard in education in Oregon. I also say, liberally support your normal school and plant more of them in eastern Oregon as the population increases and the country develops.
