fund have also been busy and doing good work. The secretary has completed the new list and the work of collecting begins today. After giving the matter full consideration the executive committee has authorized a discount of 5 per cent on all subscriptions paid a year in advance any time during this month. This step is adopted in order to facilitate the work of the officers and give the prompt payers the benefit of their cash.

Several important matters are under discussion by the board of trade which will be for the benefit of the city. One of the most promising of these is the forthcoming session of the State Bankers association. An effort will be made to bring the same to Salem, and the Salem bankers will, no doubt, heartily co-operate in this movement. Steps are also being taken to further shape up the Third Annual Cherry fair, which is to be held here this summer under the auspices of the board of trade. Steps are also being taken to assist in the matter of having a magnificent float in the Rose Show at Portland this summer.

Through the efforts of Secretary Hofer, the S. P. company has supplied 10,000 special folders for Salem, giving detailed information concerning the colonist rates during March and April. These have been supplied to all business houses and offices for inclosures in eastern correspondence. The matter in this folder has been especially prepared for Salem, and indicates, "Colonists Rates to Salem, Oregon, daily during March and April, 1908." Any individuals who have not received these circulars and who can make use of some, are invited to call at the board of trade office and get what they want. Every letter that goes out of Salem to the East during the next six weeks should contain one of these little folders. In fact, much other good literature, which is supplied free by the board of trade, should be mailed out regularly by our people to eastern correspondents. All persons are invited to make use of those privileges.

But he didn't mind that and put on one hair-lifting melodrama after another, and it must be admitted he caught the theater-going public in great shape, and had the Capital City dramatic world following at his heels at ten cents per reserved seats two-bits.
