BIG TUNNEL PROJECT AT 'FRISCO

AN IMMENSE SCHEME

CONSOLIDATED RAILWAY COM-
PANIES, WITH OVER SEVEN
MILLION CAPITAL, WILL BUR-
ROW UNDER SAN FRANCISCO
HARBOR.

San Francisco, March 6.—To con-
struct a tube, tunnel or subway con-
necting the pier head line on the
Oakland side of the bay with Yerba
Buena Island, commonly known as

FABULOUS GOLD FIND IN NEVADA

RAWHIDE IS EXCITED

ORE IS UNCOVERED WHICH AS-
SAYS OVER NINE THOUSAND
DOLLARS TO TON—RIVALS FA-
MOUS GOLDFIELD MOHAWK.

Rawhide, Nev., March 6.—What is
considered the greatest discovery in
the history of gold mining has been
made here within the last 24 hours.
Rawhide Consolidated ground is
the scene of the rich strike, which
was made by the "Big Four" lease.
An assay of the 75 pounds of rock
taken from the hole runs \$9214 to
the ton, the proportion of the metals
being about one ounce of silver to
two and one-half ounces of gold.
Many think this strike will prove to
be greater than the one made by the
Hayes-Monnette lease on the Gold-
field Mohawk, which yielded \$5,000-
000 in 150 days.

WILLIAMS TURNED OUT OF BASTILE

WILL GIVE REGITAL

SUAVE AND VERSATILE ENGLISH
MAN TO ENTERTAIN 'FRISCO
"ELITE" WHILE UNDER BONDS
FOR FORGERY.

San Francisco, March 6.—George
B. Williams, scholarly, polished,
versatile, who cut a wide swath in
Tacoma society before coming to this
city, has been released from the city
prison in time to shake the jail dust
from his clothing before appearing
at Century Hall on Saturday even-
ing to a select audience of San Fran-
cisco four hundred, whom he has per-
suaded to subscribe generously for
a series of two Shakespearian recita-
les. Williams has languished in the
city jail for the last week, through a
little misunderstanding with the Ta-
coma police, who ordered his arrest
because, they said, he had left a trail
of worthless checks through the
northern city.

WOODBURN POSTOFFICE IS ROBBED

FOUR-DOLLAR LOSS

ROBBERS PUNCHED SAFE COMBI-
NATION OUT OF BUSINESS AND
SECURE \$300 IN STAMPS—
COULDN'T OPEN VAULT.

Woodburn, Or., March 6.—(Spe-
cial to The Journal)—The Wood-
burn postoffice safe was robbed last
night of \$300 in stamps and three or
four dollars from the till. The bur-
glars entered through the rear
door; punched the combination of
the safe until they got the outer
door open, but failed to open the
vault containing the money. They
left by the front door, which they
pried open.
The robbery was not discovered
until 5 o'clock this morning, when
Postmaster Wm. Pennebacker went
to the office to open up for the day.
The postoffice, which is directly
across the street from the depot, has
been robbed several times, the last
burglary occurring about two months
ago, when the robbery was made suc-
cessful in the same manner as the one
of last night. The men succeeded in
making their escape from the build-
ing without attracting the attention
of anyone.

DOCUMENT ADMITTED TO PROBATE

FORGETS NO FRIEND

MAKES HANDSOME GIFT TO EACH
OF GOLD WATCH AND CHAIN
TO VALUE OF \$125—ESTATE
VALUED AT \$166,750.

The last will and testament of the
late Hon. Tilmon Ford, who died at
the home of his cousin, W. M. Kaiser,
last Sunday, was filed and admitted
to probate this afternoon, and W. M.
Kaiser and his sister, Mrs. Angie M.
Warren, of Portland, were named co-
executors of the document. The es-
tate is valued at \$166,750, consisting
of real and personal property in Ma-
rion, Lane, Multnomah and Wash-
ington counties, principally in Ma-
rion, and it is divided among his five
surviving legal heirs and 42 other
relatives and friends.
His only heirs at law are Mrs. An-
gie L. Warren, Portland, sister;
Frank M. Ford, Rochester, Montana,
and Charles D. Ford, Seattle, broth-
ers, and Mrs. Lulu M. Marquam, Eu-
gene, and Minnie Cox, Portland,
nieces. Included in the list of devise-
es are the Willamette University,
the Sisters' Academy of the Sacred
Heart, and Chemeketa lodge, I. O. O.
F. Salem, each of which is be-
queathed \$1000, Olive lodge, I. O. O.
F., \$500, and the local Y. M. C. A.
and W. C. T. U. organizations, each
of which is given \$300.
One of the most beautiful features
of the will is that deceased did not
fail to remember many of his most
intimate friends and acquaintances
in life, to 39 of which he set aside
the sum of \$125 each to purchase them
a gold watch and chain of their own
selection, or they are at liberty to
choose a diamond ring, pin or other
ornament, if they prefer, to the value
of \$125. This feature alone demon-
strates the whole-souled and kind-
hearted disposition of the deceased,
and the fact that he never forgot a
kindness or favor shows him in life

Key route, and the San Francisco &
Bay counties railway, which recently
incorporated for the purpose of con-
structing an electric line to San Jose,
and to build two minor lines. The
capital stock of the consolidated cor-
poration is fixed at \$7,750,000.
The consolidation takes effect im-
mediately. The new corporation is
to be known as the San Francisco,
Oakland & San Jose Consolidated
railway. The directors are F. M.
Smith, F. C. Havens, E. A. Heron, H.
Wadsworth and Dennis Searls.
No provision is made for the con-
struction of a bridge or trestle to the
island, but it is provided such con-
nection shall be made by "tunnel,
tube or subway." It is stipulated
that the connection with the island
shall be made as soon as it can law-
fully be done, and as soon as per-
mission can be obtained from the
United States and the state of Cal-
ifornia.

JAHN CLAIMS PRICE HAD NO RIGHT TO LIVE

Everett, Wash., March 6.—J. H.
Jahn, of Spokane, who yesterday af-
ternoon shot and killed Jesse Price,
mining man, at Darrington, refuses
to make any statement regarding the
crime, stating that any man who
cared for his home and family would
have done as he did. He predicts
that when he tells his story in court
"there won't be a dry eye."
Jahn has wired to Pittsburg for
special counsel. The crime was com-
mitted after a lengthy conference
between the two men in the office of
the Darrington Gold Mountain Min-
ing Company. There was trouble be-
tween them, which originated years
ago in the East.

JAP SHOTS WOMAN AND THEN HIMSELF

Sacramento, Cal., March 6.—As
the result of a mysterious shooting
early this morning Kitchi Makamura
and Mrs. Fano Kuwabara, both Jap-
anese, are dead. According to the
story of the woman's husband, Mak-
amura entered the room where he and
his wife were sleeping, with a gun
in his hand. Kuwabara covered his
head with the bed clothes while
Makamura shot Mrs. Kuwabara, and
then turned the weapon on himself.
Jealousy is presumed to have been
the cause.
