### ROBBER BANDIT KILLED

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, March 6.—After holding up a saloon keeper and exchanging shots with him at 1 o'clock this morning, a robber at the end of a thrilling pursuit by policemen and other citizens, in which dozens of shots were fired, was killed by one of the bluecoats in the center of Jefferson square.

Adolph von Tiedemann, who conducts a saloon with his brother on McAllister street, went to close the side door and was met by the robber.

The latter told von Tiedemann to throw up his hands. He backed the saloon keeper behind the bar, secured \$2, and, apparently losing his nerve, bolted.

The saloon man grabbed up his revolver, ran to the door and pursued the robber, firing. The latter turned and fired as he ran. Dashing into Jefferson square, the bandit ran into Policeman Louis Nye near its center. Nye's revolver was leveled, and he shouted "halt."

"I'd just as soon be killed as go to prison. I'm — if I'll halt," came back the answer.

Nye fired once and the bandit fell dead almost at the foot of his pack of pursuers.

### MRS. GADDIS WANTS MONEY FOR DUCKING

Mrs. Gaddis, of Roseburg, through her attorneys, Fullerton & Olcott, has served notice on City Recorder Moore, demanding that she be paid \$150 damages for a broken arm she sustained by falling into the creek between the depot and the Florence Hotel on December 31, last.

Mrs. Gaddis started to take a short cut from the depot to the hotel, but fell into the creek, thinking she was about to cross on the bridge. She was pulled out of the water by W. W. Skinner. The city will probably not pay the demand, as it was due to no fault of the city that she missed the bridge.

### ROTTENNESS EXPOSED IN BOTONYI FOLD

New York, March 6.—Before Justice O'Gorman, in the supreme court today, Mrs. Auriel Batonyi, formerly Mrs. Burke-Roche, filed a suit for absolute divorce against her gentleman-coachman husband, indicating seven co-respondents, some by name, others by description.

At the same time in the court Auriel Batonyi filed a counter-suit, asking for an absolute divorce, and specifying eleven co-respondents. Chief among those named in Mr. Batonyi's list of co-respondents is Frank K. Sturgis, broker, banker and secretary of the Jockey Club. Others than Sturgis are indicated by name, and some are indicated by description.

In moving for trial, Edward Alexander, counsel for Mr. Batonyi, specified that the hearing should be held in open court.

## ESPEE TAKES A HAND IN CAMPAIGN

### TAFT FORCE BEATEN

SOUTHERN PACIFIC AGENT MAKES CANVASS OF NEVADA, AND WILL CONTROL CONVENTION—SENATOR ANKENY FAVORS TAFT.

Reno, Nev., March 6.—It looks as though Taft had been eulogized out of the Republican endorsement in Nevada. L. M. Blakeslee has returned from a tour of the state with enough proxies in the state central committee to control the primaries. Blakeslee is a Southern Pacific agent, and an anti-Taft man. He made the tour of the state for the special purpose of getting enough delegates to beat Taft.

The Taft element, headed by Geo. Springmeyer, will make a bitter fight, but the advantage is all with Blakeslee. It is stated that Hughes will get the benefit of the Blakeslee proxies.

#### Tacoma Republicans Organize.

Tacoma, Wash., March 6.—Seventy-five Republicans from the various counties of the state met at the Tacoma Hotel last night and formed the "Washington Taft League," to boom the secretary for the presidential nomination. Ralph Metcalf was elected president, and Mayor Moors, of Spokane, first vice-president; J. T. Blakistone, of Seattle, second vice-president; Samuel L. Lemon, of Seattle, secretary; Alexander Polson, of Chehalis, treasurer.

State Senator Paulhamus wanted the state central committee to meet at once and endorse Taft, notifying the war secretary that this state is with him.

It developed that Senator Ankeny has been organizing Ankeny-Taft clubs over in the Walla Walla country, and has made considerable progress in that direction. The Jones men were considerably put out by this move, and will try to head the Ankeny movement off.

Blakistone objected to the resolution endorsing Roosevelt's policies. He said there were many Taft men in Seattle who would not subscribe to all the doctrines of Roosevelt. He was voted down. The league notified Taft, and promised him 75,000 plurality at the election.

#### JAPANESE CITY IS ATTACKED BY FLAMES.

Tokio, March 6.—Fire today attacked the city of Nadawoy and 400 houses are known to have been destroyed. No loss of life has been reported, but it is not improbable that many have been burned to death. Estimates on the total damage done has been placed as high as \$2,000,000.

## SMALLPOX IS DEPOPULATING JAPAN ISLES

Dying Off by Hundreds at Kobe from Fatal Malady.

Portland, Or., March 6.—Smallpox in its most malignant form is killing off hundreds of Japanese every day, declare the officers of the Pacific liner Numantia, from Hongkong and Kobe, which reached here late last night.

The Numantia omitted most of its Japanese ports of call on her return trip on this account. As many as 100 natives a day were dying in Kobe while the Numantia was in that port.

to whom the article was sent, is said to have been contained in a paper written by Emma Goldman. Today the trend of these writings was made public, and, as a result, feeling is running high against all anarchists, and Miss Goldman in particular. The police admit that serious trouble is likely to result if the "reds" attempt any demonstration.

All the hatred engendered by the famous Haymarket riots has been called up by the attempt to assassinate Chief of Police Shippey, the anti-clerical demonstrations, the recent activity of the red leaders, and more especially by the alleged tirade of Emma Goldman hurled at President Roosevelt.

The last feature of the trouble has attracted the attention of the federal offices, and Miss Goldman is today said to be under constant surveillance by the secret service men. So far no authentic copy of Miss Goldman's article, said to have been written only for the eyes of the inner circle of the anarchists, has been obtained by the officers, but detectives are scouring the city, and if a copy can be found, and its authorship proved, an effort will be made to lodge a charge against the "Queen of the Reds," against whom the police admit they have to date nothing on which to base an arrest.

#### Says Averbuch Was Murdered.

Chicago, March 6.—Emma Goldman, in whom so much interest has centered since Chief of Police Shippey killed Anarchist Averbuch, announced today that she will address a meeting to be attended by anarchists tonight.

The woman anarchist says that all the talk about the authorities deporting her is "rot." She declares she does not feel bad over the death of Father Heinrichs, who was assassinated by an anarchist in Denver a few days ago, but expressed regret at the death of Averbuch.

"That was a cruel murder," were the words she used in speaking of his death. She says Olga Averbuch, sister of the dead assassin, greatly assists the cause of anarchism.

#### Bispham in Command.

#### Corvallis Times Discusses Proposed Amendment to Increase the Pay of Members of the Legislature.

Whether or not legislators should receive \$3 or \$10 per day is a question voters will have to pass on in June. Members receive \$3 a day or \$120 per session at a regular session now. They also get mileage at 15 cents per mile, coming and going one trip to and from the session by the most usual route. A constitutional amendment was submitted at the last session, raising pay to \$400 per regular session, with \$560 for presiding officers, and, instead of mileage, their full expenses to and from sessions. The change will increase the salary cost of members from \$10,800 to \$26,000 per session.

There has never been a dearth of legislative candidates. The old pay always brought on its crop of them. It is not probable that any good man has been kept from seeking election to the legislature, by reason of the smallness of the salary. It is doubtful if more pay would bring out any better men. If money is the object of their going, they are not likely to be good timber anyway. Legislators who would be attracted by the larger pay would go from mercenary reasons, and would be no better, if as good as those who go because it is an honor, and a citizen's duty. All things else at the legislature are increasing in cost, and this item, it might be well to keep the lid on.
