EUGENE SCHOOLS TO MAKE AN EXHIBIT

(Supt. Alderman in Eugene Guard.) The teachers and pupils invite you and your friends to visit the exhibit Friday evening and Saturday afternoon and evening at the high school. The exhibit will be open at 7 o'clock on Friday and at 7:30 a short program will be given. Another program will be given on Saturday evening at 7:30. There is no charge for admission.

A word of explanation might be necessary in regard to the nature of this exhibit. The note books were not made for show purposes, but contain all the written work of the pupils for the last month. It is the regular work of the pupils. In addition to the written work will be exhibited the drawing and sewing of the pupils. This is the second year that drawing has been taught in the schools and the first year in which sewing has been taught. The latter has been taught by the public-spirited, enterprising women of Eugene, without expense to the district, under the leadership of Mrs. Professor Terrill. The work will show the possibilities along this line.

The carpentering work takes the form of bird houses and was entirely optional on the part of the pupils. The Griffin Hardware company and the Chambers Hardware company each offered valuable prizes for the best bird house. After the exhibit is over each child will be urged to put up his or her birdhouse in a convenient place for birds.

The bread on exhibition is voluntary work on the part of the pupils and is in competition for the prizes kindly offered by the Eugene Mill & Elevator company.

It is hoped that as many of possible may visit the exhibit and see what the schools are really doing. The children will be encouraged to do better work if the citizens in general recognize the importance of it. It is the desire of the board of directors to make the Eugene schools second to none in the United States for efficiency and far-reaching results.
