#### TO VACATE THE S. P. LAND GRANT

#### IN WESTERN OREGON

RESOLUTION OF SENATOR FULTON TO BRING RESULTS—VALUE OF HARRIMAN LANDS IS PUT AT \$50,000,000—TO BE TRIED SOON IN THE FEDERAL COURT AT PORTLAND.

 San Francisco, March 7.—Southern Pacific officials here have been served with a federal summons to appear in the United States circuit court at Portland, Or., in the case of Snyder vs. the Oregon Railway and Southern Pacific, two Harriman roads. The case involves the legality of Harriman's land grant in Western and Southwestern Oregon, which now amounts to 3,000,000 acres, but which originally was 6,000,000 acres.  
 This is the suit by a citizen to contest the land grant, and is supplementary to the efforts being made by United States Senator Fulton, of Oregon, to have congress adopt a resolution instructing Attorney-General Bonaparte to bring a suit in the name of the government to oust Harriman from the land grant because he is violating the terms on which his railroad got it from congress about 30 years ago.

#### PRESIDENT'S YACHT IS AGROUND

#### JOKE ON THE NAVY

ARRANGEMENTS ARE NOW MADE FOR THE GREAT NAVAL REVIEW TO BE HELD AT SAN FRANCISCO ON MAY 5—FLEET MAY GO TO AUSTRALIA FOR A VISIT.

 Washington, March 7.—The Mayflower, President Roosevelt's yacht, on which Mrs. Roosevelt and party are taking a cruise, is aground near Old Point Comfort. Three tugs are pulling at the Mayflower, which is in command of Lieutenant-Commander Vogelsang, in an effort to release her. The Mayflower reached a point near Thimble shoal light at 10 o'clock last night, when she ran aground.  
 The fact that Vogelsang, a recent critic of the navy before the senate investigating committee, is in command of the vessel, gave room for a lot of "joshing" at the navy department.

#### RESTLESS REDS IN FRISCO

#### DENOUNCE GLORY

EXCITING MEETINGS ARE BEING HELD ON THE WATER FRONT AND SPEECHES MADE ROASTING TH GRAND OLD STARS AND STRIPES—LAWLESSNESS IS TO BE SUPPRESSED.

 San Francisco, March 7.—The spirit of unrest that pervades the ranks of the anarchists of the East has extended to San Francisco. The local police are in possession of information which discloses a plan of the "reds" to hold a mass meeting tomorrow afternoon on the water front, to be addressed by the principal speakers of the local organization.  
 Captain of Detectives Kelley has been requested by Chief Biggs to detail two men from his office to the meeting on the front tomorrow afternoon, in addition to the regular patrolmen.  
 Excited mass meetings have been held every Sunday on the water front. No later than last Sunday a speaker declared that if he could find volunteers he would proceed himself with the destruction of the wharves and piers of private steamship companies. Constant insults are hurled by them at the flag, and every insulting allusion to it is greeted with delight by the lawless element of the audience.  
 Chief of Police Biggs has been in consultation with the captain of detectives relative to the control of this element. Extreme precautions will be taken to safeguard the vessels of the Atlantic fleet.  
 Strong details of police will be present at Jefferson square meetings tomorrow afternoon. The least sign of lawlessness will be suppressed.

#### ATTACKS OF HARDEN

EXCITEMENT IN THE COURT OF SPAIN OVER A PROSPECTIVE ROYAL CATCH NEXT JULY—ANNA GOULD WAS NOT MARRIED TO ANOTHER COUNT, AS WAS AT FIRST REPORTED.

 Berlin, March 7.—The Kaiser has confirmed the military sentence against Count von Hohenau, one of his distant kinsmen.  
 The trial of the count was the outgrowth of the sensational charges made against the "Knights of the Round Table" by Editor Maximilian Harden. He has been dismissed from the army and loses all of his decorations. Count von Hohenau is a close friend of Count von Moltke, against whom Harden directed his severest charges.  
**Stork Holidays.**  
 Madrid, March 7.—King Alfonso's courtiers are expressing much dissatisfaction at his majesty's order reducing the period of festivities in honor of the announcement of the stork's expected return to the royal family, from three to two days.  
 The king is much more anxious to simplify the court ceremonial than are his old-fashioned advisors to see innovations in what they regard as almost sacred customs.  
 Dr. Conde San Eusebio, who visits the queen daily at Seville, says her majesty's health is all that can be desired. The stork is looked for in July. He brought the crown prince May 10, last year.  
**Anna Still Single.**  
 Berlin, March 7.—All efforts to confirm the report that Anna Gould, former wife of Count Boni, and Count De Sagan, Boni's cousin, were married in a German village recently have failed. The Kaiser denies the report that he expressed himself as favoring the match. The story of the marriage, which originated in the Ori de Paris, a newspaper, is generally discredited.

roads should sell the land to actual settlers at \$2.50 an acre, in tracts not exceeding 160 acres. The contention is that Harriman is violating these terms of sale.  
 The Snyder suit and the proposed United States government action are said to promise a big sensation about the alleged law. The 3,000,000 acres of land involved consist of some of the most valuable timber land in the world, which is said to be worth, according to present prices, between \$20,000,000 and \$50,000,000. If individuals and timber syndicates, which have bought some of the timber land from the railroads in violation of the terms of the grant are brought into the contest, it is estimated that there will probably be a \$100,000,000 stake in the fight.

 Levine, whose sole offense was an attempt to investigate the condition of the Russian poor, was arrested at Minsk, December 22. He was not permitted to communicate with his country's diplomatic representatives in the Czar's realm, and every effort by his friends to account for his disappearance ended in failure.  
 The prisoner was kept in the closest confinement in the meantime, kicked and flogged by his jailers and starved until his health is permanently ruined.  
 Not only is his immediate release demanded, but it is expected that Russia will be called on to apologize for the manner in which he was treated, to pay a heavy indemnity and to inflict the severest punishment of his persecutors.

**Pageant at Frisco.**  
 Washington, March 7.—Rear-Admiral Pillsbury, chief of the bureau of navigation, has announced that it is highly probable that Rear-Admiral Evans' fleet will reach San Francisco bay on May 5. It was hoped that the ships would arrive sooner, but a delay will be due to the acceptance of invitations to stop at San Diego and other ports en route to San Francisco.  
 As announced, 45 ships will be in the pageant. The vessels will be aligned in four columns. The ships will be about 420 yards apart, and about double that distance will be allowed from column to column. The review is to be made by the secretary and whatever staff he may select, from the cruiser Yorktown.  
 It was announced at the navy department that the President is about to make a formal statement of the itinerary of the fleet of Admiral Evans after it leaves Manila.  
 Eight of Admiral Evans' ships are to return to the United States via the Suez canal.  
 Since these arrangements were made the Australian government asked the United States government to have the ships of the fleet visit Australian ports. Secretary Root replied, substantially, that the itinerary had not yet been made up, and that he had no official information as to the movements of the fleet.  
 It is believed now that the invitation of the Australian government will be accepted.

**AMUNDSEN WILL LEAD EXPEDITION.**  
 (United Press Leased Wire.)  
 Oakland, Cal., March 7.—Captain Amundsen, who is in Oakland, says he expects to lead his third expedition to the Arctic in July, 1910.  
 "My course will be through the Behring Sea, and then straight into the ice of the unknown region," he said.  
 "It will take four or five years, perhaps, to drift across the ice into the Arctic seas, but I will take enough provisions for a five-year cruise."  
 Captain Amundsen will sail in his small vessel, the Gjos, which already has a reputation as an Arctic traveler.  
 Captain Amundsen's expedition will be purely scientific. He will study the currents of the sea and the climatic and magnetic phenomena. He says he will not hunt for the north pole, because, he says, this pole is merely a geographical point, and is of no importance to human knowledge. On March 14 Captain Amundsen will leave for Seattle.  
**JAPAN MAY ISSUE AN ULTIMATUM.**  
 (United Press Leased Wire.)  
 London, March 7.—In official circles here it is declared that the question of war between Japan and China hinges on the next meeting of the Japanese cabinet at Tokio.  
 Should Japan issue an ultimatum, it is thought that the Celestial government would yield and release the Japanese steamer Satsū Maru. British officials say Japan expects war, and is preparing for it.  
**Uncle Sam Not Informed.**

 Washington, March 7.—Up to 2 o'clock this afternoon the state department had not been officially notified of the ultimatum agreed upon at the cabinet meeting at Tokio today.
