NORTH SCHOOL NAMED THE GRANT SCHOOL

At the meeting of the Board of Education February 15, Director A. A. Lee offered the following resolution for adoption by the Board of Education:

Whereas, At the Arbor Day Exercises in 1907 it was proposed to name the North Salem school, Grant School, in honor of the late President and general of the armies of the United States, and

Whereas, By a rising vote it was decided by the large assembly of citizens present at that meeting that the North School be so named, therefore be it

Resolved, By the Board of Education of Salem District No. 24, that this board officially recognize that act of the citizens and that the North Salem School hereafter be officially designated in our proceedings as the Grant School of this district.

The resolution was made a special order for the regular meeting this evening, when it will come up for adoption.

The election of a city superintendent for the ensuing year was also made a special order, and City Superintendent J. M. Powers will probably be unanimously re-elected.
