#### CHINA WINS TWO POINTS

#### WILL TRY OFFICERS

BUT THE EMPIRE OF THE SUN SUCCEEDS IN STOPPING CONTRABAND TRAFFIC IN ARMS AND AMMUNITION THAT HAS BEEN ENDANGERING HER SAFETY.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, March 9.—The Chinese-Japanese war cloud has been scattered. China has capitulated diplomatically. Japan, after standing out determinedly for an unconditional back-down by China has graciously made concessions which allow China a settlement with honor. Though the final details of the adjustment of the knotty diplomatic tangle have not been worked out, the crisis is over. The general conditions of the adjustment were cabled here today and are as follows: China releases the steamer Tatsu Maru and restores her Japanese flag to her commander. An official note of regret from the Chinese state department is forwarded to the Japanese foreign minister, Hayashi. #### HUGHES SUPPORT CHILLY

#### NEW YORK IS GOLD

BOSSSES BOAST OF HAVING DEFEATED ALL HIS REFORM MEASURES—FRIENDS OF TAFT ACTIVE IN WASHINGTON—CARRY NEARLY EVERY COUNTY IN THAT STATE FOR BIG BILL.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, March 9.—"We will go to the national convention in Chicago cheering for Hughes, but we will take particular attention to impress upon the delegates from other states the fact that not one thing the governor has asked has been made a law by the present legislature." This statement was made today by a state senator who has gone on record as favoring the promotion of New York's governor. Taken in consideration with other things, it indicates very clearly that the New York delegation, while ostensibly for Hughes, will not be remarkable for its loyalty. Hughes' friends still claim that he will be nominated to succeed Theodore Roosevelt. They admit, however, that if he wins it will be in spite of the covert hostility of the majority of his own state delegation. As things look now, the primaries

#### COOKE'S ATTACK ON DAY

#### WANTS HIM OUSTED

SO THAT THE METHODIST CHURCH WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR HIS UTTERANCES AS HEAD OF ONE OF ITS EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS ANY LONGER.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Brandon, Vt., March 9.—"Hireling of the oil trust" is but one of the pet names Rev. George Cooke calls Chancellor Day today in a statement of his attitude regarding the charges he has brought against the chancellor. Rev. Cooke's statement is in the nature of a defense of himself, and his stand from the insinuations publicly expressed by the chancellor since the charges which may result in his expulsion from the church were brought. Rev. Cooke says: "The reply of Chancellor Day to my charges reveals the thin and shabby texture of his defense. That he has sold his character and his influence to the Standard Oil trust is so plain that he who runs may read. If statement that 'Cooke is something of a joke to those who know him,' and that he seems to have a mania to bring charges against someone, is childish and absurd on the face of it. "The church has been scandalized and humiliated long enough by Day's venomous attacks on President Roosevelt, and there is a widespread feeling that he ought to be expelled from the church, so that he alone will be responsible for his utterances."

#### RODGERS FOR THE PRIMARY

#### STOPS THE CLOCK

METHODS ARE NOT RELISHED BY THE PEOPLE—MAYOR CATCHES THE DRIFT OF THINGS POLITICAL AND SAYS THE CONVENTION HAS NO BUSINESS TRYING TO MAKE A TICKET.

In the second ward primary Mayor Rodgers showed that he had some conception of the gravity of the attempt on the part of the Salem leaders to put up a legislative ticket. He offered a motion that the delegation be instructed to oppose the plan of putting up a legislative ticket, or endorsing anyone for office in this county. After debate this was rejected by the leaders present. Then he moved that it be the sense of the meeting that the delegates oppose making or endorsing a ticket, and that was rejected. Then he moved that the delegates go uninstructed to the convention. This carried, but, as it presents no moral force, was a defeat of the principle at stake, the overthrow of the direct primary. Says the Law is Strong. Mayor Rodgers says the law is stronger with the people, and is right in principle. He did not take Statement No. 1 when he ran for the legislature, and does not believe in it, but he says it is wrong to call a convention and try to take the making of any part of the ticket out of the hands of the people. The people have the primary law, and are going to keep it, and should not be asked to surrender making the legislative ticket. He wanted the second ward to go on record for what he believes is right, and use its influence with the rest of the delegates to keep the convention from making a serious tactical political blunder, as it has started out to do in trying to make a legislative ticket. Statement No. 1 Stronger. At Liberty precinct an instructed Statement No. 1 delegation was chosen without opposition, just because there was some leadership in the person of Bruce Cunningham. The same thing would have happened in many other precincts if there had been anyone to lead the opposition to the convention plan of making a ticket. Many precincts, as it is, have mixed delegations, and some are solidly for Statement No. 1 and the Direct Primary. The indications are the convention will refrain from putting out a ticket "unalterably opposed to Statement No. 1," but will leave all making of tickets to the people, and will endorse the much-hated Direct Primary law, with no one to oppose them in the primaries, the machine leaders have suffered a virtual defeat in the first round. The signs of the times are that Marion county will elect a straight Statement No. 1 legislative ticket. Candidates Are Popular. Hal. D. Patton and Henry J. Miller, of Aurora, have received many assurances of support from Republicans all over the country, and there are other Statement No. 1 men preparing to enter the field. Friends of Dr. H. C. Epley, of the Stalwart quarter, are urging him to become a candidate, and he is considering the matter. He says if he runs it will be on a Statement No. 1 platform, as he believes in putting the election of a United States senator right up to the people themselves, as he says he believes it is the duty of a representative to abide by the decision of the big Republican majority in this state. The law makes it their duty to choose the senator and the duty of the representatives to obey their mandate, and that doctrine is good Republicanism in his opinion. Dr. Epley is a member of the school board, and a bedrock party man. If he decides to run he cannot be defeated for the nomination or election.

of the cargo, which the Chinese claim consisted of contraband arms and ammunition for the Chinese rebels, has not been made public, nor has the future policy of China in dealing with these expeditions. It is believed, however, that it is on these two points that China has scored. It is reported here unofficially this afternoon that China's proposition that shipment of arms and ammunition on the Tatsu Maru be recalled has been tentatively accepted by Japan, as well as China's request that Japan take steps to suppress the traffic between Japanese contrabandists and the Chinese rebels. The full condition of the settlement will probably not be made public until after the receipt by the Japanese officials of China's apology for the incident.

Tokio, March 9.—No news of a peaceful settlement of the Tatsu Maru controversy with China has been received here. Secretaries are busy in the office of the state and foreign secretaries, but no official statements are available. A story given wide publicity in London by a prominent news agency and stating unqualifiedly that a settlement had been effected is discredited here. An aggressive policy is being advocated unanimously by the press, and the general impression here tonight that a demonstration against China is but a few hours off, unless the Pekin government tenders a speedy apology. The activity of the navy department is probably responsible for a rumor here that this demonstration will take the form of a forcible recovery of the Tatsu Maru.

Ames, Kitsap; O. T. Cornwall, Walla Walla; J. W. Lyons, secretary of the state committee. Taft is named as second choice by two committeemen, Ellis DeBruier, Seattle, committee chairman, expresses himself as personally friendly to Taft, but declines further to commit himself. After slight repairs have been made the explorer will start in his journey, sailing through the Northwest passage.

**ILLUSTROUS NOBODY MADE A KNIGHT.**

**HE TOOK MORPHINE FOR SUICIDAL PURPOSE.**  
(United Press Leased Wire.) Centralia, Wash., March 9.—Arthur Murray, a plumber, 25 years old, employed by the Kerr Hardware Company, died this morning after taking morphine with suicidal intent. He left a note which has not been made public. He regained consciousness and talked rationally of the affair. He denied that he had any love entanglements, and ascribed his act to whiskey. Then he died.
