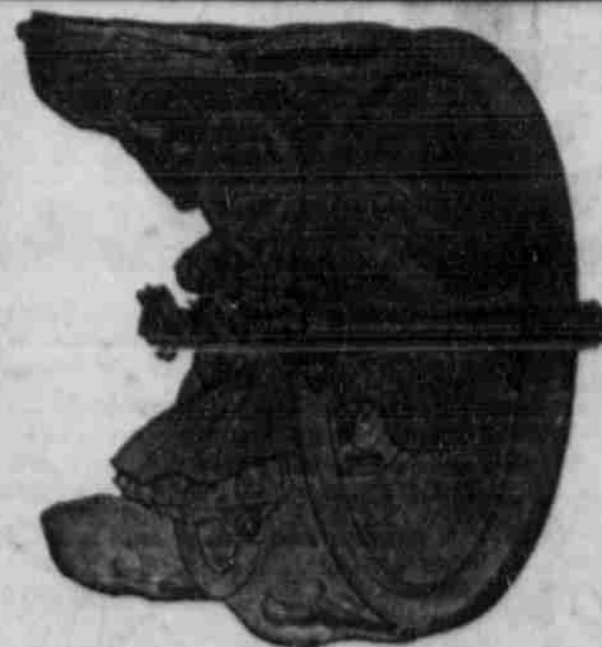
No court at Salem until Wednesday, when Judge Galloway resumes the Danbar trial.
