DEMOCRATS PLANNING CAMPAIGN

It was decided at the meeting of the Democratic committee held yesterday afternoon in the old Grange building at State street to place a full and complete legislative ticket in the next general election. A mass meeting has been called for March 23 in the Grange building and at that time a list of candidates will be recommended and named.

The following delegates have been named to attend the state convention to be held in Portland April 9: Johnson—William A. Lamb, Horton—Ed. J. Faruham, Barton—Arthur Elder, Kelly—W. H. Downing, Burton—Geo. Cussiter, H. Angel—John Ebner, Woodburn—Francis Peller, Liberty—James Coleman, Nelson No. 4—D. J. Fry, Nelson No. 2—W. H. Holmes, Nelson No. 6—A. N. Dalrymple, Nelson No. 1—F. W. Steusloff, Clatsop—Geo. O. Savage, P. L. Frazier and T. C. Davidson of Liberty, received informal nominations for the office of county judge and county commissioner, respectively.

Resolution No. 1 was strongly approved by a resolution at the meeting, Governor Chamberlain was endorsed for the United States senatorship, and Wm. J. Bryan was pledged by the committee for the presidential candidacy.

WARDEN VAN DUSEN ACCUSED

Accusing Master Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen of incompetence and partiality, which has resulted in over 75 per cent of Oregon Columbia river fishermen taking out licenses in Washington, F. A. Suffer, F. N. Warren and Walter W. Ridehaigh, this afternoon, before the Board of Fish Commissioners, urged his immediate removal from office, and the appointment of a fair-minded successor.

Governor Chamberlain this morning informed H. M. Lornsten, Ed. Rosenberg and I. J. Kearns, representatives of the lower Columbia fishermen that the board would make no recommendations to the voters of the state without first getting the opinion of experts of both the state and government, which is impossible at present. Rosenberg consumed the entire morning session presenting evidence to the board showing how the upper river wheels were ruining the salmon trade. The upper river canners recommend the appointment of Herman A. Webster, of Oregon City.

A Salem special to the Portland Journal says: The political rays are turning on the office of Master Game Warden. The present holder of the position, H. G. VanDusen, is slated, almost without doubt, to lose his official head because of alleged partiality toward upper Columbia river fishermen.

Van Dusen arrived in the city yesterday, and, under the protection of a consort of lower Columbia river fishermen, who are ready to use their every effort to have him retained in his position, went direct to the governor's office to find out "what was stirring." Van Dusen's retinue consisted of Ed. Rosenberg, secretary of the Fishermen's Union of the Pacific; H. M. Lornsten and I. J. Kern, all of Astoria.

If they thought they would overwhelm the governor and the remainder of the Board of Fish Commissioners into agreeing to retain Van Dusen, they were mistaken. The board, which consists of Governor Chamberlain, Secretary of State Benson and State Treasurer Steel, refused to hear any arguments until representatives of the upper river men could be present. Consequently F. A. Suffer and F. N. Warren were communicated with, and agreed to come here today.

Regarding a successor for Van Dusen—for it is the unanimous opinion of the board that he should go—no one has been generally selected, though Charles Babcock, of Oregon City, is the strongest candidate at the present time, he practically being already endorsed by Treasurer Steel. This endorsement is more than has been done by either Chamberlain or Benson, neither of whom have yet advanced a name.

It is the unanimous opinion of the board that neither an upper or lower river resident be selected. The following names have been handed in to the board with recommendation for appointment: J. U. Campbell, of Oregon City; Herman A. Webster, of Oregon City; Charles Babcock, of Oregon City; H. C. McAllister, of Portland; W. A. Mack, of Portland. Both Governor Chamberlain and Secretary of State Benson remain non-committal, refusing to express their stand, but Treasurer Steel asserts that he will uphold an Oregon City candidate against all others, and as Campbell has retired from the fight in favor of Babcock, the latter has become the strongest of the patronage of Steel. Campbell desires if Babcock be not chosen he still be considered as an applicant. Next to Babcock, H. C. McAllister appears to be the strongest candidate, standing well in the opinion of Benson. The

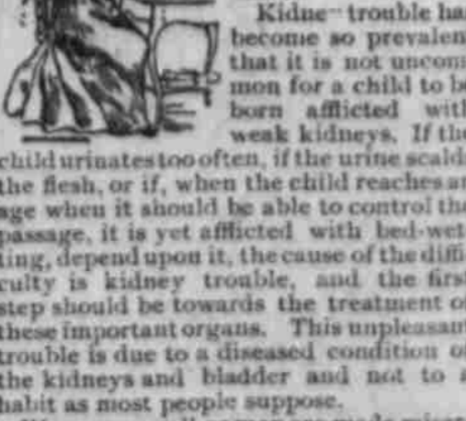

NEW YORK HAS BAD SCORCHING

New York, March 10.—Twenty firemen were seriously injured and a quarter of a million dollars damage was sustained today in a bad fire which for a time threatened to sweep the entire Fourteenth street shopping district.

A lack of water pressure and the bursting of more of the now famous "scandal hose" greatly handicapped the firemen and seemed to prove Chief Croker's recent statement that all New York is at the mercy of a really serious fire, because of the rotten hose with which the department is loaded up.

Today's blaze affected more than fifty retail firms most of them small dealers. At one time the flame attacked Siegel & Cooper's big department store and the scene looked exceedingly grave, but the lack of wind enabled the firemen to gain control.

Riders Shot and Pillaged.

Louisville, Ky., March 10.—Shortly before daylight today a band of 100 armed and mounted "night riders" swept down on Birmingham, Marshall county, and terrorized the negro inhabitants of the place. Six of the blacks were shot, one fatally and five others were mercilessly flogged, and told to leave the county under penalty of death.

Almost at the same time a band of 200 "riders" visited Brooksville, and, after first taking possession of the telephone exchange, in order to prevent the spread of an alarm, visited the tobacco warehouse and forced the watchman to point out the pooled and independent tobacco. They then carried out 40,000 pounds of the pooled leaf and burned it, forming a circle about the fire and standing guard until all of the tobacco was consumed. They then disappeared, and no arrests have been made.

MAYOR'S ACCUSERS SENTENCED TO JAIL.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Portland, Or., March 16.—E. E. Radding and Mrs. Belle Waymire, who were recently convicted of attempting to blacken the reputation of Mayor Lane by arranging to build up a case of "assault" against him, were sentenced this morning. Radding was given six months in the county jail and Mrs. Waymire was sentenced to four. Thirty days' stay was granted the defendants in order to perfect their appeal. In the interim Mrs. Waymire's bail was reduced from \$1000 to \$750.

Portland Has Tong War.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Portland, Or., March 10.—Renewal of the bloody tong war between the two factions of the Bow On is momentarily expected in Portland Chinatown. Saturday night three Bow On waylaid and killed Le Dal Hoy. Today four hatchet men, the police say, who were imported from San Francisco to revenge Hoy's death, arrived and are awaiting a favorable moment to strike.

This morning a sensation was created in Chinatown, when it awoke to find every deadwall in the district placarded with large red posters publishing a proclamation from the Bow On tong to the residents of the Chinese colony. It declares that the trouble in the Bow On tong was strictly a family affair, confined within the limits of the Jue family, and that the Bow On did not desire any interference upon the part of any other tong.

A special detail of police are patrolling the district to prevent any more killings.
