### IOWA PRIMARY MURDER

### RESULTS IN DUEL

POLITICAL DIFFERENCES CON-  
CLUDE WITH A CHALLENGE  
AND CHOOSING OF SECONDS—  
HYDE, A YOUNG MAN, HAS  
RUN AWAY FROM SCENE OF  
KILLING.

Amite, Ia., March 11.—Murder  
was added to the bitter political  
feud in this vicinity when Senator-  
elect D. S. Kemp, a Democrat, was  
shot and instantly killed last night  
by C. F. Hyde, who is prominent in  
this part of the state as a politician  
and business man. The feud at-  
tained a climax in a quarrel follow-  
ing the recent Democratic primar-  
ies, at which Kemp was successful.  
As soon as it had been announced  
that Kemp had emerged from the  
primary fight victorious Hyde sought  
him, and a quarrel ensued. Friends  
tried to patch up the trouble between  
them on more than one occasion dur-  
ing the day, but the bitter feeling  
increased hourly.  
When the two men again last  
night the quarrel was resumed. In  
a fit of desperation Hyde drew a re-  
volver and fired point blank at his  
opponent. The first bullet hit Kemp  
and he fell mortally wounded. He  
died within a few seconds. The ex-  
citement occasioned by the tragedy  
is intense today. Threats against  
the life of Hyde are freely made. Hyde  
surrendered, and is being closely  
guarded in his cell.

UNHAPPY VICTIM OF OUR DE-

### COLORED SOLDIERS CENSURED

### FOR RIOTING

ALL PUBLIC LANDS IN OREGON  
ARE TO BE SURVEYED—OKLA-  
HOMA WILL INSTRUCT FOR  
TAFT IN SPITE OF HIS PLAIN  
SPEECH THERE.

Washington, March 11.—The com-  
mittee on military affairs in the sen-  
ate today filed three reports on the  
Brownsville shooting affair, in which  
colored soldiers were involved.  
The majority report was signed by  
Senator Warren, chairman of the  
committee, and the minority report  
bears the signatures of Senators  
Scott, Bulkeley, Hemenway and For-  
aker, and the third is signed by For-  
aker and Bulkeley. The Warren re-  
port sustains the contention of the  
President in the matter, while, ac-  
cording to the view of the minority,  
the evidence was unreliable, and the  
rights of the soldiers should be re-  
stored through legislation. The  
third report differs from the minority  
report, in that it completely vindi-  
cates the soldiers.  
The majority finds that the shoot-  
ing was done "by some soldiers, but  
the testimony fails to identify any  
particular ones."  
In accordance with the wishes of  
the President, the majority will sub-  
mit a bill providing for the re-enlist-  
ment of the soldiers.  
Baseballists Object.  
Tacoma, Wash., March 11.—A  
half dozen representatives from the  
labor council in the leading cities of  
Washington appeared before the  
Northwestern baseball league magnates  
yesterday, and declared if the  
Spokane franchise was voted to the  
Natatorium Park people instead of  
the Recreation Park Company, the  
present owners, the Northwestern  
league would be placed on the un-  
fair list.  
Telegrams were also read from  
every large town from Portland to  
Butte, protesting against the change.  
After the magnates had listened to  
the speeches of the labor leaders and  
heard the telegrams, they adjourned  
until tomorrow afternoon before tak-  
ing final action upon the matter.  
Survey Oregon Lands.  
Washington, March 11.—Senator  
Heyburn has secured the passage  
through the senate of his bill provid-  
ing for the survey of all public land,  
reserved and unreserved in Idaho,  
Oregon, Montana and California. Under  
the present system, the govern-  
ment only surveys land upon the re-  
quest of actual settlers. Mr. Hey-  
burn says this system tends to retard  
development.  
He will confer with the Oregon,  
Montana and California senators and  
have an amendment made to the  
sundry civil bill appropriating suffi-  
cient money to begin these surveys.  
New State for Taft.  
Oklahoma City, Okla., March 11.—  
Early indications are that Okla-  
homa will instruct its delegation solidly  
for Taft at the convention being  
held here today. There has been  
some slight opposition, and an effort  
to create interest in La Follette's can-  
didacy, but the Taft men say they  
hold the situation safe.

### GREAT BRITAIN MAY LOSE INDIA

LONDON, MARCH 11.—THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT HAS REALIZED THAT A CRISIS IS IMMINENT IN INDIA, WHICH CALLS FOR SOMETHING MORE THAN MERE PUNITIVE EXPEDITIONS AGAINST FRONTIER REBELS.

CUMULATIVE ADVICES FROM AUTHENTIC SOURCES SHOW THAT REVOLUTION IS READY TO BREAK FORTH AT A DOZEN POINTS THROUGHOUT THE GREAT INDIAN EMPIRE. UNREST AND SEDITION ARE RIPE AND LAWLESSNESS EVERY DAY BECOMES MORE DIFFICULT TO SUPPRESS.

THE LATEST MOVE MADE BY THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT WAS THE SENDING OF GENERAL SIR JAMES WILLCOCKS AT THE HEAD OF A PUNITIVE EXPEDITION AGAINST THE ZAKKAKHELS.

**It Was a Duel.**  
Later reports show that in a duel carefully arranged and fought to settle the bitter political feud between them, D. S. Kemp, Democratic state senator-elect, was shot and killed last night by C. F. Hyde, one of the leading politicians and business men of this community.  
After a violent quarrel, in which Kemp slapped Hyde's face, after the latter had accused him of untruthfulness, the two men agreed to settle their differences, growing out of the recent Democratic primaries, in a duel.  
Hyde challenged Kemp, and the latter instantly accepted. Both men appeared on the scene at the appointed time, measured the distance. No time was lost. A signal was given and both fired. Hyde's marksmanship was accurate, for the first or second bullet he fired inflicted a fatal wound. Kemp's bullets went wide of their mark. The wounded man died almost instantly. Both men had seconds, and, so far as can be learned, they were the only ones present besides the contestants.  
There had been bad feeling between Hyde and Kemp for some time, but their friends did not realize that the feud might have a fatal ending, until the two men clashed yesterday. Hyde is in jail, where he is being closely guarded.  
Hyde, who is only 24 years old, ran from the scene, and has not been arrested. One of the witnesses says Kemp did not shoot.

**NOBODY TO BLAME FOR SCHOOL FIRE.**

Cleveland, O., March 11.—The coroner's verdict returned today in the case of the Collinwood school fire disaster indicated that no one will be held responsible for the deaths of the 164 children.  
The decision of the jury is that the fire started in a closet from overheated furnace pipes. Janitor Hirtor is exonerated from all blame. The coroner attributed the loss of life to panic which followed the alarm of fire.  
**DIRECT PRIMARY SUITS AT TACOMA.**  
Tacoma, Wash., March 11.—The first test of the direct primary law was made in Tacoma yesterday and was generally satisfactory, but it is roundly scored by the independent voters, who were not in it at all yesterday, the politicians having inserted a provision in the law that put him out of business.  
John W. Linck won the Republican nomination over four candidates. Mayor Wright was renominated by the Democrats.  
**To Release Degenerate.**  
Auburn, N. Y., March 11.—The petition asking for the pardon of Chester Gillette, murderer of Grace Brown, will be presented to Governor Hughes next week. The parents of the convicted man secured the names to the petition.

**HARRY ORCHARD WILL PROBABLY HANG.**  
Boise, Idaho, March 11.—Only one punishment is possible for Harry Orchard, under the plea of guilty made by him in the district court at Caldwell yesterday. He will be sentenced to hang for his crime. Orchard says he will not ask for any mercy, and will be ready to pay the penalty.  
**PIONEER CAPTAIN OF INDUSTRY DEAD.**  
San Francisco, March 11.—Captain R. R. Thompson, founder of the Oregon Steam Navigation Company, and one of the most prominent capitalists in the city, died here yesterday at the age of 88 years.
