ROBBED BY HYPNOTIC POWER

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, March 12.—A remarkable tale of having lost \$182,000 worth of his stock through the alleged hypnotic power of George H. Carpenter, said to be a Princeton graduate, is told by Rudolph A. Breidenbach, a millionaire diamond importer.

Breidenbach's story has been unfolded through bankruptcy proceedings, started by the diamond merchant' attorneys, against Carpenter to ascertain the whereabouts of the jewels.

Breidenbach declares that Carpenter mesmerized him into believing that the latter's financial resources were so strong that he allowed him to take away \$182,000 worth of his diamonds without leaving the cash behind.

SQUADRON REPORTED

which arrived and anchored off this port last evening entered the harbor early this morning.

Shortly after daybreak this morning the fleet, lead by the big flagship, Connecticut, steamed slowly through the narrow passage into the shelter of the magnificent land-locked harbor.

As the great fighting monsters swept into the calm waters of the bay the tropical sun glistening from their white hulls and dazzling the eye as it struck the shining barrels of the big guns, a marine spectacle was afforded of a grandeur seldom, if ever, before witnessed.

When the flagship steamed past the El Centinela, the huge rock that guards the inner harbor, and made for her anchorage in Man-of-War Cove, an admiral's salute boomed forth from the guns of the cruiser Buffalo, the only naval vessel in the harbor, which was answered by the Connecticut.

A wonderful testimonial to the power and efficiency of the ships and the men of the navy, comes in the word that the squadron can be cleared for action in an hour.

According to a dispatch sent to the navy department by Admiral Evans, shortly after the fleet dropped anchor off this port last evening, the ships composing the Atlantic fleet are in better condition now than when they departed from Hampton Roads last December on the longest battleship cruise in the world's history. The armada arrived full two days ahead of the schedule. Seven days and 20 hours only were consumed in the journey from Callao, Peru, a distance approximately 3200 nautical miles.

The unexpectedly early arrival of the fleet caused much surprise. The itinerary prepared by the navy department did not call for the arrival of the ships at Magdalena bay until Sunday, the schedule thus being beaten three days. A speed averaging 10 1/2 knots was maintained throughout the run from Callao. Not an incident happened to mar the historic cruise; not a thing has gone amiss with the machinery of any vessel.

The men of the battleship crews will be given a rest until Monday, when the strenuous work of target practice is expected to begin.

When target practice has been finished, probably in about three weeks, the squadron will steam on up the coast, ready for the greeting which the whole Pacific coast of the United States has prepared for it.

MATRIGIDE GETS PRISON FOR LIFE

San Francisco, March 12.—For the crime of slaying his own mother, Erland H. Soderberg, must spend the remainder of his life in prison, according to a verdict just returned.

The evidence brought out the revolting fact that after Soderberg had committed the crime he mutilated the body. The attorneys for the defense tried to convince the jury that the matricide was insane at the time, but did not succeed. The court instructed the jury, however, that it could bring in a verdict of not guilty by reason of insanity.

DIAMOND MARKET MAY DROP

New York, March 12.—Malden Lane, the wholesale diamond district, is in the air today over the report from London of a probable break in the diamond trust, which will probably mean a 50 per cent reduction in the price of uncut stones.

The threatened break hinges on the probability of the Premier Company of the Transvaal not renewing its contract with the Beers Company, by which the two now control the world's output. As the Transvaal government receives 60 per cent of the proceeds of the Premier mines, it objects to the policy of curtailing the output, now enforced by the trust for the purpose of keeping prices up.

Until the issue is decided, which will be in a few days, the diamond market is at a standstill.

W. W. HALL REPLIES TO W. BUSHEY

Ed. Journal: In your issue of Monday, March 9, 1908, you publish an accusation against me made by Wm. Bushey in regard to some report which he claims I am circulating.

As to the matter of his being Judge Scott's candidate, that is simply an old trouble which I have long since dropped, so far as I am concerned.

As to his not being on the tax roll. On the morning following his announcement as a candidate he came to the office where I was at work and cursed and called me names because his name was not on the tax roll, and claiming that I should have told some one so. His name was not on the 1906 roll. He bought a piece of land in May, 1906, after the assessment was made in March, and did not record his deed until the same day he published his attack upon me, March 9, 1908, and the deputy

assessor in the locality where the land is located, Mr. E. A. Taylor, of Mohama, assessed the land to the former owner.

He did not curse nor call names through the public press because he was not assessed with property in 1906. I do not recall saying he was not a taxpayer, but if I did the records justified the statement.

I have no knowledge of deeds not recorded, and for Mr. Bushey to try to assume an injured air in this matter is babyish in the extreme.

I am trying to conduct a manly campaign, regret that any personalities whatever have been injected into it, and my first impulse was to ignore his charges. What is told against me, whether it be told in Mr. Bushey's interest or of some other candidate, I expect to take without complaint, not going about abusing other candidates of being the author, and will not be running into the public press with little grievances.

LAND BOUNDARY

SUITS BEING HEARD.

Two suits to determine boundaries of large pieces of land in Llan county are being tried before Judge Galloway in the circuit court. The plaintiffs in the suits are B. F. George, Wm. Cullums, et al., and the defendants are W. H. Hesseman and E. L. Wheeler. All the parties interested claim interests in sections 30 and 31, township 9 south, range 4 east. The properties, when originally staked off, were fenced in and so remained for 15 years, but at the end of that period the plaintiffs claim to have discovered that the defendants fenced in part of their land. Judge Galloway is being called upon to appoint a commission to see to the resurveying of the land.

W. H. Holmes appears for the plaintiffs and Carson & Cannon and Hemit & Sox represent the defendants.
