Special says: Superintendent of Schools J. Ackerman, who has been visiting throughout the east with the state agricultural board, returned to this city Tuesday.

the higher courses of learning, such as the regular universities and agricultural colleges, which are allowed a much larger proportional appropriation. The purpose of the trip, which lasted five weeks, was to investigate the manner in which eastern institutions are teaching industrial studies and manual training. Ackerman is not prepared to introduce any immediate changes, but will improve the domestic and manual training courses as he is able from time to time. Dr.

Kerr, on the other hand, has decided upon certain drastic changes for his college, which will be put into operation at once. Ackerman and Kerr, as members of the National Educational association convention, which they attended, were granted a reception by President Roosevelt, who went thoroughly into the school question. Ackerman was appointed on a committee of the convention to prepare statistical forms to be presented to the commissioner of education at Washington, which forms are to be recommended for uniform use throughout the United States.

Among the colleges visited by the Oregonians were Cornell, Columbia, state agricultural college of Minnesota, Stout Manual Training school of Wisconsin and agricultural colleges at Madison, Wisconsin, Champagne, Illinois, and many other similar universities.

**AN AMERICAN'S DESCRIPTION OF A SPANISH BULL FIGHT**

My impression of Mexican bull fights are most likely those of all Americans who have witnessed them—how anyone can enjoy seeing man and beast in conflict, with the chances ten to one in the man's favor, I cannot understand. In my estimation any game is devoid of sport where any one party has an unequal chance.

A large party of Americans, including myself, went over into Jaurez, Old Mexico, Sunday, January 19, to see a bull fight for the first time. The celebrated Spanish matador, Guino, was billed to appear (salary \$4000 for the one performance) and do battle with the "ferocious beasts." We each paid our \$1.50 in good American coin and found seats in the bleachers, near the center of a dirty bunch of Greasers.

The band played a Spanish air the bugles notes sounded, and the fun began.

Out marched the entire bunch of fighters in order, the two matadors, five picadores, and three spear-men, riding nags that were almost ready for the soap market. The horses to be sacrificed to the bull's horns, but the men fully protected by steel shields on foot and legs. They marched around the ring twice, bowing and waving to the big crowd and then the bugle sounds again. They all hide behind the barriers, the gate is opened, in charges a bull. Mad? Yes. Who would be with a barbed fishhook stuck in his back, with red streamers attached?

The bull makes for the first thing he sees a horse. He is met by the rider's spear, but keeps on going, and usually rips the horse with a gash as long and wide as your arm. The rider is unhurt. The picadores run up with their bright colored banderillos, one in each hand, waving them at the bull and of course the bull follows the colors and the picadores, who nimble sidesteps and sticks the two barbed spears into the bull's shoulder. The placing of the banderillos is about the whole business, as it requires delicate footwork and a quick eye.

After these barbs are securely placed, the bull is ready for the matador. "Butcher Smear," bedecked in gay colors with red cape concealed a long sword, he walks straight up to the bull who charges for the cape, of course not for the man, and all the man has to do is to sidestep and the bull passes on, turns and makes another drive, for the cape. After tiring the bull till he does not care to fight anymore, the matador stands immediately in front of the bull, takes aim with his sword, and just as the bull charges, plunges the sword into his neck, through his heart, to the hit, and the Mexicans yell with delight, throwing their hats into the ring, which is the Mexican way of showing their appreciation. In the meantime, the Americans turn away in disgust. An American would delight in seeing the bull finish the matador, instead of the opposite.

This same program is repeated four times. Altogether four bulls are butchered. A sickening disgusting sight to anyone who admires fair play and enjoys good sport.

The bull has no chance whatever for life. It's nothing but rank butchering.

They won't allow prize fights in Mexico. They claim it's brutal.

The ring was crowded with women and children who yelled with delight, same as the men. There isn't even a semblance of sport to a bull fight. It is down right butchering and a blot on civilization. It seems incredible that such things could occur in this age.—Roy Tribue.

**Limiting Liquor Selling in Great Britain.**

A new "licensing bill" was introduced by the government in the house of commons on the 27th. The bill provides for the compulsory reduction, within a specified period and on a uniform scale, of the number of regular saloon licenses throughout the country. The number of saloons to be licensed is based mainly upon the density of the population. In cities it is proposed to allow one saloon for every 750 persons, and in the country districts one saloon for every 400 persons. This regulation, it is estimated, will wipe out in the neighborhood of 30,000 licenses, about one-third of the present total, the reduction to be effected in 20 years. In presenting the bill

the chancellor of the exchequer, Mr. Anquith, declared that in the opinion of the government all effective reform in this field must aim at the attainment of two principal points—namely, a progressive reduction of the excessive facilities now allowed for the retail sale of intoxicating liquors, and the gradual complete recovery by the state, with due regard for existing interests, of its property in a monopoly which it has improvidently allowed to slip from its control.
