SUIT TO SETTLE

TITLE TO LANDS.

Judge Galloway this morning met with the attorneys in the suit of Hattie E. Mansfield, as guardian of Alfred L. and Naomi C. Mansfield, minors, against J. L. Hill, Addie Thompson, et al., in an effort to adjust objections and exceptions taken to the decree given by the circuit court, which decree was in favor of the defendants, and from which the plaintiffs are preparing to appeal to the supreme court.

The suit was begun some years ago to contest the disposition made of certain lands and many thousands of dollars by Claude H. Mansfield, father of the plaintiffs, at the time of his death. The decision of the court practically gave the defendants two-thirds of the estate, allowing the plaintiffs but the remaining one-third. P. H. D'Arcy and Daniel Murphy represented the defendants and Henry St. Reiner and W. Billow appeared for the plaintiff.
