ARGUMENT FOR TAX ON LOCKS

Eminent Lawyers Appear Before the Supreme Court.

The suit of the state of Oregon against the Portland General Electric company to compel the latter to render an accounting of and turn over 10 per cent of the amount of tolls received from the locks at Oregon City was argued at length before the supreme court here yesterday.

Attorney General Crawford, who appeared with Judge W. P. Ford for the state, argued that according to the terms of the legislative act, which granted the \$200,000 for the building of the locks, that the 10 per cent should be paid and that at the end of 20 years the state was to have had the right to purchase the locks. He called attention to the omission in the brief of the defendant to any claim that the Willamette Falls & Locks company, the original company controlling the locks, should not have had to pay the percentage. Crawford dwelt strongly on the error of the defendant in assuming throughout the entire case that the locks and river were in the nature of a constructed highway, whereas the river is a natural highway and not an asset of the company.

The defendant's main point, as brought out by Attorneys Frederick V. Holman and Wirt Minor, was that they were not responsible for the failure of their predecessors, the Willamette Falls Canal & Lock company and the Willamette Falls Canal & Transportation company, to pay over their share of the tolls; also, that no claim had been made that they had the books of those two companies in their possession. Attention was called to the number of legislatures and officials who had passed through office and never demanded this percentage.

M. L. JONES FOR COUNTY JUDGE

On Questions of County Finance, Road Building and Other Matters of Office.

M. L. Jones, candidate for county judge, gives the following interview:

The management of county finances should be simply the adoption of the best business methods. The fixing of the amount of the business of the county, and the levying of taxes should be uniform and equal as provided by the constitution of the state. We could have the methods followed by several of the eastern states whereby the entire state revenue is shared by the state administration. The payment of county expenses would be very much simplified if the amount necessary would be reduced so that the taxes would be an unbearable burden on industry and the most important material would be the proper expenditure of the money; and as in the management of individual affairs, every business would be only what is necessary, and for full value received.

Should certainly adopt the best business methods for increasing the amount of profit as far as possible by the successful experience of the individual who pays the taxes three times as much for

his goods as his competitor will certainly make slower headway and will eventually be forced out of business.

"Marion county has wonderful natural resources. There is opportunity for wonderful development, but at no time should the taxes be permitted to increase faster than the reasonable income of her producers and business men would justify. If we require more revenue for improvements, as we will, we should wait for greater development of our resources and income. Nothing will be so great an attraction for outside capital and home investments, as careful, prudent, economical, progressive business methods in the management of our county finances.

"County bridges must certainly be maintained. The building of good roads should be encouraged, and wherever county money is expended for this work, it should be done thoroughly so that the improvement would be permanent, and at the lowest possible cost, and not to exceed the reasonable requirements and income of the people where built.

"Very generally the people are doing their own thinking as to what they desire and expect to accomplish. They seem very glad to meet and talk with those who are before them for official positions. They have made up their minds to secure not only a good administration of affairs, but the best possible administration.
