#### DEFENSES ON THE PACIFIC

#### AS ON ATLANTIC

COAST IS TO BE FORTIFIED  
AGAINST AN INVASION FROM  
ORIENTAL PORTS—CAPTAIN  
WAINWRIGHT SUCCEEDS AD-  
MIRAL EVANS IN COMMAND OF  
FLEET.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Washington, March 14.—Millions  
of dollars for the fortification and  
coast defenses of the Pacific sea-  
board of the United States and for  
the Philippine islands will be car-  
ried in the fortifications appropria-  
tion bill, which is now under con-  
sideration by the house committee  
on appropriations. A prominent  
member of the committee said today:  
"The bill will take due cognizance  
of the situation in the Orient and on  
the Pacific seaboard. It will make  
provision for as great protection on  
the Pacific coast as there is now on  
the Atlantic coast. There will be no  
 stint, we think, in the allowance of  
money made for the protection of  
this country from any possible for-  
eign foe."

**To Succeed Evans.**  
Washington, March 14.—The navy  
department has decided to recom-  
mend to the President the selection  
of Captain Richard Wainwright to  
succeed Admiral Evans as command-  
er of the United States Atlantic fleet,  
now at Magdalena bay. The selection  
will carry with it the command  
of the fleet on its cruise around the  
world.

It is quite probable President  
Roosevelt will approve the selection  
of Wainwright, of whom he person-  
ally is fond, but the names of Cap-  
tains Sperry and Schroeder are al-  
so mentioned in connection with the  
appointment. It is understood that  
the change of commanders will not  
take place until just before the fleet  
sails from San Francisco for the re-  
mainder of its cruise around the  
world. In the meantime it is quite  
probable that congress will pass an  
act making Evans a vice-admiral.

Captain Wainwright, who likely  
will succeed Evans, will be remem-  
bered as one of the conspicuous  
heroes of the naval engagement off  
Santiago harbor, when he pluckily  
sent the little converted yacht,  
Gloucester, into the thick of the  
fighting and exchanged shots with  
the big armorclads of the Spanish  
fleet.

**Recall Men of North.**  
Seattle, Wash., March 14.—As a  
result of mental derangement of  
Master Signal Electrician George  
Treffinger, at Fort Davis, Alaska, the  
war department has issued orders  
that as soon as navigation opens, all  
army men who have been in the  
north more than two years are to be  
withdrawn. Treffinger has been con-  
stantly on duty in Alaska since July,  
1904, having been retained there  
upon his own request.

The trouble with Treffinger is sup-  
posed to be due to the rigorous cli-  
mate, and the conditions under  
which the army men have to serve  
in Alaska. There are now 35 en-  
listed men on the signal corps who

#### JAPAN SENDS A FLEET

#### ON SEALED ORDERS

ANNOUNCEMENT CAUSES GREAT  
EXCITEMENT IN OFFICIAL CIR-  
CLES—IS BELIEVED TO BE  
BOUND FOR A CHINESE PORT  
—ELECTIONS IN JAPAN.

Hong Kong, March 14.—Japan is  
making definite preparations to effect  
the release of the steamer Tatsu  
Maru, which was seized by the Chi-  
nese government by force, and a  
squadron of the Mikado's biggest  
cruisers and a number of smaller

**TONAPAH GOLD STRIKE**  
**OF \$200,000 PER TON**  
Tonopah, Nev., March 14.—In-  
habitants of this city and vicinity  
are excited over another rich  
gold strike that has been made  
here, this time in the Round  
Mountain camp. Reports from  
there today state that it is the  
biggest of the kind ever struck  
in this district. Eight inches of  
ore, practically pure gold, was  
struck at a depth of 100 feet. It  
is estimated it will run \$200,000  
to the ton.

fighting vessels are about to start  
for Macao.

A dispatch received today via For-  
mosa says that a Japanese squadron  
is about to sail on a secret mission  
under sealed orders. In this squad-  
ron are the cruisers Yakuma, Asama  
and Akitsushima and a flotilla com-  
posed of torpedo boats and other  
small craft of this type.

The announcement has caused in-  
tense excitement in the official cir-  
cles of Hong Kong and the govern-  
ment at Peking has bestirred itself  
more than at any time since the  
trouble over the Tatsu Maru first  
broke. It feels that Japan is about  
to make the attack that it threat-  
ened to make in the event that  
China failed to indicate that it in-  
tended to release the steamer. While  
there is no means of learning the  
destination of the squadron, the  
Chinese officials at Hong Kong do  
not doubt that it will be bound for  
Macao when it receives the sailing  
orders that have already been pre-  
pared for it.

**Review of Events.**  
On February 7 Chinese officials  
seized the Japanese steamer Tatsu  
Maru, off Macao, charging she was  
carrying arms to Chinese rebels.

The Japanese flag was hauled  
down, and the crew held as contra-  
bandists. Tatsu Maru taken to  
Whampoa, on the Canton river,  
where she is now held.

Baron Hayashi, Japanese minis-  
ter to China, delivered ultimatum  
from Japanese foreign office, de-  
manding immediate release of the  
Tatsu Maru, the payment of indem-  
nity and that Chinese warship salute  
the Japanese flag when again raised.

China sought mediation. Japan  
refused. Yuan Shi Kai, of Chinese  
foreign office, advised complying  
with Japan's demands.

Dowager empress interferred and  
declared war preferred to settlement  
such as Japan proposed.

#### STRUGGLE OVER A CABLE

#### CHINA LEADS OFF

JAPAN GETS A SLASH IN THE  
FACE—JAPAN IS PLANNING  
AROUND-THE-WORLD STEAM-  
ER LINE—AMERICAN RAIL-  
ROAD WANTS CONNECTION  
WITH ORIENTAL COMMERCE  
BY WATER TRANSPORTATION.

London, March 14.—China today  
dealt Japan another figurative slash  
in the face by notifying the Mikado's  
government that she would not re-  
cognize the transfer to Japan of the  
shore rights recently granted the  
Great Northern Company, a Danish  
telegraph and cable company.

Japanese statesmen are said to be  
in a boiling rage over the affair,  
and complications are regarded as  
certain.

The trouble is over the Shanghai-  
Nagasaki cable. Recently Japan  
completed arrangements to take  
over the shore rights and privileges  
granted the Danish corporation. This  
would have given her control of both  
ends of the cable. When the Peking  
government heard of this it notified  
the Great Northern Company that  
the transfer would not be sanctioned.

There is much speculation as to  
why Japan has not forced the issue  
on the Tatsu Maru incident, and a  
general belief that China has called  
the Mikado's bluff. Opinion differs  
as to whether Japan is being re-  
strained by the British attitude or  
by the lack of funds.

**Extend Japanese Lines.**

Victoria, B. C., March 14.—The  
Toyo Kisen Kaisha, a Japanese line  
operating services between the Ori-  
ent and San Francisco and from Yo-  
kohama to Chile, has under consid-  
eration the establishment of a round-  
the-world service, according to ad-  
vice received here from Tokio. The  
project, according to a Japanese  
newspaper, will involve the flotation  
of a loan of 25,000,000 yen for the  
purchase of liners for the service,  
etc., a large fleet being required.

The itinerary proposed for the  
line differs from that of other round-  
the-world services operated by the  
Blue Funnel, Kosmos and Char-  
gours Reunis lines, the steamers plying  
from Yokohama by way of the  
Orient and Suez to Liverpool, thence  
to New York and by way of American  
ports and Cape Horn and West Coast  
ports to Puget Sound, thence home-  
ward. On the completion of the Pan-  
ama canal, the intention is to use  
that waterway.

#### GEORGE ENTERS THE RACE

#### FOR U. S. SENATOR

authoritative source it has been  
learned that Governor Chamberlain  
will announce his candidacy for the  
United States senatorship in the  
Sunday morning papers of this city.  
He has been at Yaquina Bay for a  
few days, inspecting the oyster beds  
under the control of the state, and  
prepared a statement which he has  
given to the press, reviewing the  
whole situation, and advising the  
people to stand by the laws of the  
state that provide for direct nomi-  
nation and direct election. The argu-  
ment reviews the struggle that has  
been going on in Oregon to take this  
matter entirely out of the hands of  
the legislature, and place it where  
all parties have said it belongs, with  
the people themselves, regardless of  
partisan machine considerations.
