ELECTRIC POWER PLANT

Project for Furnishing All Coos County With Electricity Progressing.

J. S. N. Smith, electric and consulting engineer of the Coquille Valley Power company, which is back of the project to develop 2000 horse water power at the head of Brewster valley, and bring electricity for lighting and power into North Bend and Marshfield, and C. C. Carter, vice president of the same company, are on Coos Bay today in the interest of their enterprise.

The gentlemen held a conference with L. J. Simpson of North Bend and a number of other business men in both cities. They are very much in earnest in their work and say that the work of actual construction on the new enterprise is only a question of a short time.

The last issue of the Myrtle Point Enterprise has the following in reference to the organization of the company:

A meeting of the stockholders of the Coquille Valley Power company was held in this city last Monday night and officers were elected. Regular meetings of the corporation will hereafter be held on the third Monday of each month.

At last Monday's meeting the following officers were elected:

- F. E. Davenport, president. C. C. Carter, vice president. W. F. Hendricks, secretary. F. E. Davenport, W. F. Hendricks, C. C. Carter, J. R. Benson and D. H. Johnson, of Coquille, directors.

At the meeting of directors it was decided to place a small amount of stock on the market, and a number of investors have been coming forward with subscriptions to a corporation that they believe is destined to work a wonderful change in this section of the country.

The pipe line of the power plant has been surveyed, and profiles of the system furnished, while applications for a pipe line right of way have been made and the matter of right of way for the pole line has been taken up with the county court, so that the power may be brought down from Brewster valley and distributed to the consumers.

The work of development is proceeding, and will go forward more rapidly as soon as the weather will permit of the work in hand. The prospects for the early building of the plant are now excellent, and the certainty of the value of the corporation, both to the country and the shareholders, is conceded by all who know their plans.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

CONTRACT LET

To Chris Howland for the New Alco Annex.

The contract for the new Alco club annex was let last night by the directors to Mr. Chris Howland, at \$2698. This includes the painting of the old building as well as new. There were five bids, Messrs. F. T. Blount, R. D. Snell, J. A. McChesney and B. F. Thayer also figuring on the contract, the bids ranging up to \$2950, three being close together, \$2825, \$2830 and \$2840.

The contract calls for the completion of the building by June 1. Work will be pushed as fast as the weather permits. In preparation it will take a while to get the lumber out, when work will be pushed, and the boys will soon have one of the best gymnasiums in the state.

WHITMAN TO GET \$1,500,000

Pacific Coast Must Raise \$500,000 for Endowment of Walla Walla Institution and the East Will Do the Rest—Active Campaign Has Been Started.

Whitman college has been promised \$1,500,000 by New York and Chicago capitalists, according to ex-Governor Miles C. Moore, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. The college which was founded by pioneer residents of the Walla Walla valley, can have this amount providing \$500,000 can be raised on the Pacific coast, and an active campaign will be commenced in the near future to raise this amount in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

"We have positive assurance of great financial support, amounting to at least \$1,500,000, for Whitman college, which will make it the model college of the north Pacific coast, if we can raise \$500,000 in the Pacific northwest," said Mr. Moore. "The Whitman college board and I have the Whitman college board and I have every reason for believing that the enterprise will be successful. There are several men in the northwest who have been kindly treated by Dame Fortune in the past few years who will undoubtedly do their best to help raise the funds required here.

"If all our plans bear fruit, Whitman college, which is now a non-sectarian institution, will be to the Pacific northwest and the state of Washington what Leland Stanford university is to California and what Yale is to the east."

It is well known that certain Chicago men of vast wealth have liberally endowed Whitman college in the past, but it is also stated that the spurces in the East are willing to subscribe \$1,500,000 for Whitman providing a liberal spirit is shown by men of means in the Pacific northwest. While the sum mentioned, \$500,000, is expected to be subscribed by citizens of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, no definite amount has been agreed upon.

FIRST EXCURSION

Trip From Vancouver Marks Completion of North Bank Line.

The Dalles special: Wednesday was the date of the big excursion from Vancouver to Stevenson, Washington, in which 400 representative citizens of the states of Oregon and Washington took part. At Stevenson, or rather at Sherman's Point a short distance west of Stevenson the ceremony of driving the golden spike was held. This completes the Portland & Seattle railway from Vancouver to Pasco.

Several citizens from The Dalles and other points in eastern Oregon made the trip, which notwithstanding the threatening weather, was an enjoyable one. The excursion train left Vancouver bearing the guests from Portland and adjacent points at 9 o'clock this morning and made stops varying from 15 to 30 minutes at every station along the line to give the excursionists opportunity to inspect the work at all stations.
