FIREBUG AFTER THE UPPER-TEN

Denver, Colo., March 16.—For the tenth time within the past year and the third time since Wednesday, the fashionable Bernard apartment house at West Eighth avenue and South Eleventh street, was set afire at 3 o'clock this morning. The blaze was accompanied by a stampede of the tenants. Only after desperate work did the firemen succeed in checking the flames.

Before the firebug started the blaze, he cut the main electric supply wire. As a result the entire building was in darkness, and it was this which threw the hundreds of tenants into a panic.

Both exits opened inward, and in the mad rush it was impossible to get the doors open until the police smashed the glass and the firemen turned a stream of water on the maddened tenants to force them back. The doors were then opened, and the tenants, a number of them severely injured, were released.

MINER PLUNGES A GAME OF ROULETTE

Reno, Nev., March 16.—Fortune has again turned her smile on Riley Grannan. Last night in Carl Young's place, he "ran a shoe string into a tannery" at the roulette wheel and is reported to have quit \$52,000 winner. Today Grannan announced that he will use the "roll" to back a bank in a new place of his own here.

The plunker started in "plinking" with a few little bets and discovered that his phenomenal luck was with him. He then began to buck the tiger, and continued his winnings, until on his last bet, which he lost, he had Young's place in jeopardy, the latter having wagered his saloon on the caprice of the little ball, against \$17,000 of Grannan's winnings.

A THUG ASSAULTS A WOMAN

San Francisco, March 16.—Suffering from the effects of a murderous attack made upon her by a thug, who dealt her two vicious blows with a blackjack, Mrs. Charles Reynolds, wife of a wealthy mining man, is today being congratulated by scores of friends on her fortunate escape from more serious injuries.

After spending the evening with friends, Mrs. Reynolds started home, passing through the fashionable district. She was passing a private driveway when a thug leaped out, seized her, and then felled her with a terrific blow. While Mrs. Reynolds was lying in a semi-conscious condition, the holdup seized her ungloved hand and tried to wrench off her diamond rings. In spite of her dazed condition she resisted the assailant and called for help. When the thug heard the residents throw up their windows and open doors, he fled.

DROVE GOOD MAN OUT OF OFFICE

Washington, March 16.—Dr. H. W. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry, department of agriculture, and foe of adulterations in food and drugs, is reported to be seriously considering resigning his office. The manufacturers who joined in protest against his rigid ruling in the application of the pure food law are said to have practically succeeded in eliminating him.

EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA VERY ILL

Paris, March 16.—Information here today indicates that the state of health of the Emperor Franz Joseph, of Austria, is much more serious than is given out in the Vienna reports. Audiences have been suspended, and it is regarded as certain that the projected jubilee plans will have to be abandoned. Though reports say the emperor is only suffering a cold, private advice have it that this illness is a recurrence of the malady which almost terminated fatally a short time ago.

GANS WILL NOT COME TO COAST

San Francisco, March 16.—There are hundreds of disappointed sports in and around San Francisco because of the announcement that the Gans-Attell fight, scheduled for March 31, has been declared off. The two clever ring generals were to have fought a 15-round contest.

The match was off when Gans sent word to San Francisco yesterday that he would be unable to come West on account of legal matters that required his attention in Baltimore. It is already agreed by the promoters of the fight that Battling Nelson is acceptable as a substitute. He will take Gans' place in the ring unless there is another hitch. The men will fight at 132 pounds, weighing in at 6 o'clock.

TO UNITE ALL THREE CITIES

San Francisco, March 16.—The plans to consolidate Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley have taken definite form, and it is now probable that the question will be submitted to a vote not later than June.

The matter has been discussed informally by clubs and other organizations, but it was not until yesterday that the Oakland chamber of commerce announced a meeting to be held Thursday for the sole purpose of launching a campaign, that it actually came to the front. If the proposition is adopted at the polls a new city and county government will be formed, to control the present municipalities, and the population will be increased at least 300,000.

RIOTERS CONTROL IN HAITI (Continued from page one.)

and Germany are hastening to the scene of trouble, and it is expected that Minister Furness will ask the Washington government for protection today. The British cruisers *Indefatigable* and *Crescent* left here at daybreak, one to each port, and the French cruiser *D'Estrees* is sailing under rush orders from Santiago de Cuba for Port au Prince.

The trouble, which has been brewing for some weeks, was brought to a head on Saturday when General Leconte became convinced that conspirators against his administration were operating from the French consulate. Under the terms of a recent agreement political foes of Leconte were granted immunity from prosecution, provided they would leave the country at once. The agreement was made with the French government, and the refugees were collecting at the French consulate at Gonaves. Saturday a letter written by General Firearm, under date of March 1, at the French consulate, and addressed to M. Masillon Colco, a prominent author and political foe of Leconte, fell into the latter's hands. In it were references to the conspiracy against Leconte, and a list of names.

The minister of the interior gave the list of names to his brother, chief of staff to the president, with orders that the conspirators be arrested and punished. The assassinations followed. Today Leconte repudiated the killings, and declared that they were without his orders. It is believed, however, that he sanctioned the action of his brother, if he did not actually inspire it.
