TAFT AGAINST BRYAN IS LINE-UP FOR FIGHT

Developments of the Week Make Both Nomination Practically Certain. Walter Wellman writes from Washington: That Taft and Bryan are to be the rival candidates for the Presidency this year is unmistakably indicated by the political events of the past week. These events have been unusually interesting and important. On the Republican side the Ohio Republicans have launched their candidate with unanimity and enthusiasm. As had been predicted by those who know the situation in that state, the entire representation in the state convention was for Taft and the entire delegation to the national convention is for Taft. All Foraker has to show for his campaign, waged with great bitterness and activity, is a pair of contesting delegates from one district. Both Senators Foraker and Dick have been completely eliminated from politics in Ohio so far as the future is concerned. The friends of Taft have complete control of the organization, with public sentiment running all their way. "Well, Taft can't be nominated, just the same." But they can't tell where the votes are coming from to beat him. They can't name the man who, in their opinion, is strong enough to get the nomination away from him.

The man in the White House is all smiles. A week ago he thought Taft would be nominated on the first ballot. Now he thinks a ballot will not be necessary and that the nomination will be made by acclamation. It is a curious fact that the one man in the country who could get the nomination away from Taft is himself working for Taft and is sure that Taft will win out, hands down. It is noteworthy, too, that every Republican convention passes resolutions of most enthusiastic approval of its policies. As this goes on, even in states which have favorite son candidates, perhaps the gentlemen in Wall street and in the capitol will at last realize that the great masses of the people of all political parties are with the administration and against every one that is not for the administration. It takes some people an awful long time to see an obvious fact.

Not only have the Republicans launched their candidate in impressive fashion, but they have boldly taken the lead as to future policies by announcing their desires, with the approval of their candidate and of the present President, for tariff revision and also for reduction of representation in congress and in the electoral college for those southern states which have disfranchised the negro voter.
