Night Naval Practice.

On Board U. S. S. Georgia, Magdalena Bay, March 19.—(By Gov-Target practice by the battleships of Rear-Admiral Evans' fleet continued steadily Wednesday, on all four of the ranges, with conditions favorable for accurate shooting. The first night target practice began last night, the targets being located by means of the powerful searchlights with which each battleship is equipped. This style of shooting part of the gunners' shrewdly-mfw developed surprising skill on the part of the gunners, who riddled the targets in a manner calculated to send terror to hostile torpedo boats in time of war.

It is unofficially reported that target practice will be finished April 10, immediately after which date the fleet will leave on the trip up the coast. Fishing continues to be the principal form of recreation indulged in by the officers and men of the fleet and the bay is daily dotted with launches and lifeboats, loaded with fishermen. Large catches are made daily.

Around the World in a Year.

Washington, March 19.—It is the desire of the administration to have the Atlantic battleship fleet arrive at some port on the Atlantic coast

He summoned officers and when the body was exhumed it was found to be that of Campanile, who had been missing mysteriously for some time. The grave, however, was that in which the body of Giovanni had been interred.

Investigation revealed the entire story. Campanile had wooed the beautiful Signorita Avellone successfully, only to break off the courtship at a time when to do so meant disgrace to the girl. Lucy related the conditions of her betrayal to her aged father, after having tried in vain to keep concealed a bright-eyed baby girl. The shock killed the old man.

The night of the funeral, the girl induced her betrayer to call at her home. Then, with the assistance of the young peasant, who was passionately devoted to her, she administered a powerful narcotic. While Campanile was asleep he was placed in the coffin from which the pair had removed the body of Avellone; the casket was closed and sealed, and the next day Campanile was buried alive. The elder Avellone was buried the following night in a hastily-constructed grave in his own dooryard.

Apparently Campanile was not suffocated, but recovered consciousness after he had been buried, and, because of his great strength, was able to break the casket seal and free his arms, but the weight of the earth smothered him before he could break his way completely through the grave.

New York, March 19.—Evelyn Thaw is today reported in a state of physical collapse, facing what to her will be dread of poverty. She has received notice that on April 1 she will be dispossessed from the splendid Park Avenue home. Mrs. William Thaw has served an ultimatum on her daughter-in-law, and left the city. It is that the latter will accept a settlement of \$25,000, and consent to the annulment of her marriage to Harry Thaw, or suit will be brought by the young man for absolute divorce, without alimony or settlement.

A mass of startling affidavits have been prepared by Thaw detectives who have recorded every move made by Evelyn during the past year, and are said to have obtained reports that Evelyn has heard the call of Broadway, and again became a frequenter of the old resorts in the white light district she described so dramatically on the witness stand. It is believed that the girl will grasp the offer, while there is yet time.

Mrs. Lemp Wants Money.

St. Louis, Mo., March 19.—Suit for divorce, with a request for \$500,000 alimony and the custody of their child, is threatened by Mrs. William J. Lemp, Jr., against her husband, the millionaire brewer, as the outcome of their differences over the 7-year-old son.

For several months Lemp and his wife have been living apart. A short time ago he began habeas corpus proceedings in order to get to see the son occasionally. Mrs. Lemp consented to have the boy visit his father one day a week, but the latter became dissatisfied with this arrangement, and has notified her husband that unless he can agree to better terms she will start divorce proceedings.

Abe Hummel Free.

New York, March 19.—Abe Hummel, New York's famous notorious disbarred attorney, left Blackwell's Island today a free man, after having served a year's sentence for subornation of perjury in the famous Dodge-Morse divorce case.

Hummel was met at the prison door by his own automobile and hustled away, but did not go directly to his home, where a regiment of photographers and reporters were awaiting for him. It is believed that he will remain in retirement for a few days.

Hummel only began his prison term after he had exhausted every known legal technicality to escape punishment. While in prison frequent reports that he was dying were circulated, and Governor Hughes was petitioned to pardon him. After an investigation by his own physician, the governor refused the pardon.
