Florence, Oregon, Jan. 16, 1908—To the Hon. C. W. Fulton, Hon. Jonathan Bourne, Jr., Hon. W. O. Hawley, and Hon. W. R. Ellis, members of the United States senate and house of representatives, Washington, D. C.:

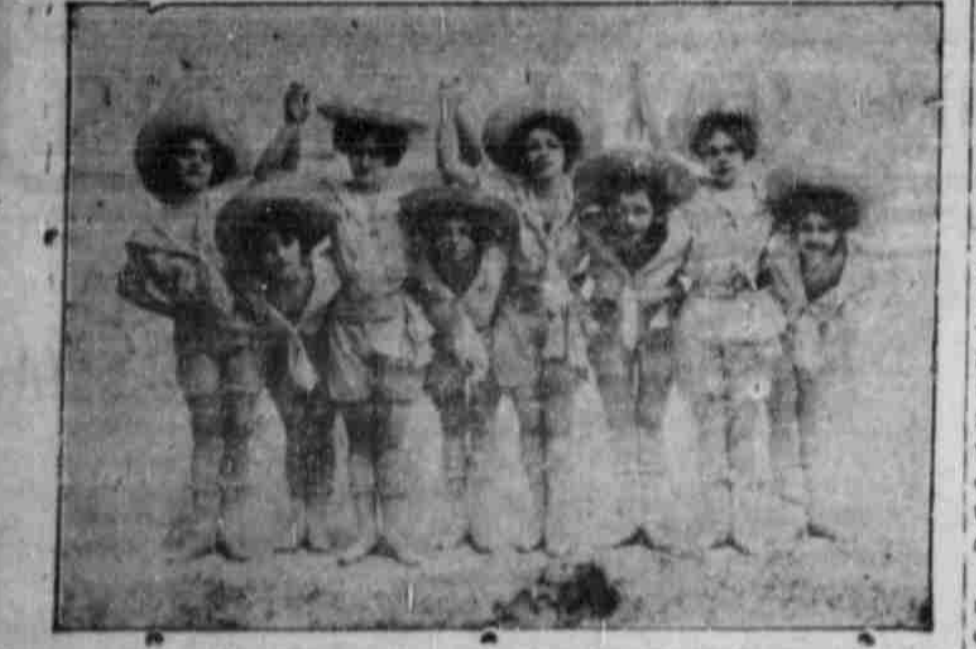
Beer is today recognized as a "Food Product," and is so dealt with by the government.
