(Continued from page one.) The trio caused her death 30 minutes later.

The young woman was employed in the house of William B. Collier, superintendent of the United States Indian supply warehouse, and left home about noon. After purchasing a quantity of wood alcohol, chloroform, and securing a gas tube, she went to Oakland and registered in a hotel. Half an hour later she was found dead. She had swallowed the alcohol and chloroform and her teeth were closed over a tube through which gas was flowing. No reason for her act is known by members of the Collier family.

Jap Store Wrecked.

By administering drastic punishment to the offending officers, the local authorities hope to avoid another "international incident," following the wrecking last night of a shoe store owned by P. Yabpe, in Church street.

Patrolman James D. Skelly, who did the wrecking, is under arrest, considerably the worse for a beating administered by a riot squad of his brother officers, called to subdue him after he had, for the sole purpose of gratifying a whim, wrecked Yabpe's shop. He is slated on a charge of drunkenness, and is smarting under the disgrace of having his star torn from his breast by the little Japanese during the melee. Yabpe has told his troubles to the Japanese consul, but no difficulty is anticipated.

MINISTERS WHO WERE BUNGOED

convict blackmailers that betrayed a group of the most influential ministers in Chicago, who were engaged in a secret movement to purify the community by exposing alleged evils in the present city administration.

The details were revealed last night following the arrest of Jacob Maroon, James Mullaney, Harry Schindler, alias "The Swindler," and Walter Huxhold, a bank clerk.

While the men are charged in police statements with having attempted to extort between \$75,000 and \$100,000 from Mayor Busse, Chief of Police Shippy and Captain Plunkett to withhold alleged information, it is clearly developed that they are deceiving the ministers and taking money from them under false representations.

The Rev. Morton Culver Hartzell, pastor of the South Park Avenue Methodist church, was one of the witnesses. He is the minister who directly managed the campaign for the betterment of conditions and the revelation of protected crime. Behind him are such famous clergymen as Jenkin Lloyd Jones, Willard B. Thorp and Austin Dubois.

The ministers claim the men were employed as reputable detectives to secure evidence of official laxness in a certain "Red Light" district with a view of cleaning it out.

An Indian Outlaw.

Butte, Mont., March 20.—The posse searching for William Mosney the alleged outlaw, took a fresh start today when John Cunningham a rancher, reported to the authorities that a man answering Mosney's description held him up three miles from Cascade on Monday night and made him boil eggs. Three months ago Mosney led a posse through snow waist deep in Northern Montana and escaped after a thrilling chase.

Fresno Bandit Pardoned.

Sacramento, March 20.—The promise of a full pardon that was made to George Sontag 16 years ago, when he was sentenced to prison for life for turning state's evidence, has been kept by the authorities.

Sontag, one of the Fresno bandits, is free today, having been released by Acting Governor Porter yesterday, and he will be restored to citizenship at once. He was promised the pardon for giving evidence against Chris Evans, one of the express robbers. Officials of the express company and Warden Aull, of Folsom prison, were active in securing the pardon. He was sentenced in 1892.

BISHOP FOWLER HAS PASSED AWAY.

New York, March 20.—Bishop Charles Henry Fowler, presiding officer of the Northern conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, died here today, after an illness lasting about a year, and following a nervous stroke, suffered while the aged divine was awaiting a train in the Pennsylvania depot at Jersey City.

Death was directly the result of his failure to rally from an operation for diabetes, performed last night. His wife and one son, Carl, a New York attorney, were at the bedside when the end came.

Bishop Fowler was 71 years of age, and for years has been a leader in missionary and fraternal church work. Since 1888 he has been a delegate to most of the foreign conferences. He was for eight years engaged in church work on the Pacific coast, and was a prime factor in establishing MacLeay college in Southern California.

STANFORD STUDENTS

"We sincerely appreciate the sentiment of the resolution submitted by the student body, but we see no reason why we should retract what we have done, and will follow our former policy."

Students Are Excited.

The resolution referred to in the report was one passed last night by the student body, in which regret was expressed for the demonstration, and the Students Affairs Committee was asked to withdraw the suspension of the 12 men on whom its hand had fallen.

This afternoon the entire student body is in an uproar. Last night the feeling in favor of a walk-out had calmed greatly. Now it is again at fever heat. The action of the committee in refusing to accept apology of the students is taken as a personal affront by virtually every man and co-ed at Stanford.

It is regarded as certain that some sort of a radical demonstration will take place tonight, as scores of the leading men of the student body this afternoon declare they will never again enter a class room, until the 12 suspended men are reinstated.

A meeting of the student body will be called for tonight, but it is not expected there will be any radical action. This afternoon the Students' Affairs Committee is sitting to hear the personal statements of 300 students who voluntarily signed the confession that they participated in the recent demonstration.

A long line of students has formed outside the doors of the college president's office, and it is probable that more than the original 300 will take occasion to enter pleas of being equally guilty with the 12 men suspended.

FORSWEARS RIGHT TO CROWN

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 20.—Friends of Miss Katherine Elkins, daughter of the senator, and the Duc A'Abruzzi, the young Italian nobleman suing for her hand, declare to day that off-dreamed of but seldom realized union of a foreign title and American dollars is about to be realized.

They say that the present case is a real love match, and in proof point out that, by making it, the duc will forswear his right to the Italian crown, for which he is now fifth in line. Up to the present time King Victor Emanuel has strenuously opposed the match, owing to his objection to his favorite cousin marrying outside of the European royal circle.

It is believed here that it is an effort to obtain the royal approval of the match that is delaying the forthcoming announcement of the engagement.

Women as Ticket Sellers.

Consul General Robert J. Wynne reports that, following a French example, the main line underground electric railways in London are to try the experiment of employing women ticket sellers, or "booking clerks."

In many quarters the experiment will be watched with interest. The principal difficulty in the way of employing women in this capacity rests in the hours of duty, inasmuch as the booking offices are open from 5 a. m. until half an hour after midnight.

The employment of young women at railway stations in Glasgow is a practice of a good many years. The Caledonian railway has about 18 female booking clerks, who began at \$2.50 and rose to \$4.50 per week. So far as their work is concerned, the girls in Scotland are stated to be a success, because it is the kind of employment that suits them exactly.

It cannot be said that the experiment had been an overwhelming success. Practically the same number of women clerks are now on the staff as 13 or 14 years ago. One drawback to the employment of girls is that it restricts the area for training youths who pass into other branches of the service.

In addition to women ticket sellers the underground electric companies are about to enlarge on an experiment, which already promises success, in the use at station entrances of automatic ticket machines with slots for half pence and multiples thereof.

STEEL PROFITS IMMENSE

New York, March 20.—Some of the enormous receipts and profits of the United States Steel Company commonly referred to as the "trust," is given in the annual report of the corporation issued today.

The statement shows that during the year of 1907 the gross receipts were approximately \$767,000,000 and the operating expenses amount to \$566,166,777. The total amount is \$69,738,491.

Third: By paving said road save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of said railway of the Oregon Electric Railway Company, with Warren's Bitum water-proof pavement. The cost of said improvement to be assessed against the owners of adjacent property provided in the charter of said Remonstrances against the improvement may be filed within 20 days from the first publication of this notice.
