BOY KILLED BY FIELD ROLLER

At the Mute School Thursday Evening the Presence of Teachers and Other Boys—His Death Was Instantaneous.

Nine-year-old Conrad Hagen was run over and killed by getting under a heavy field roller at the deaf mute school. The accident occurred at 5 o'clock, just as the driver started down the grade from the school building on the hill side, six miles southeast of the city, and it happened in this way: Two other boys were riding on the seat of the roller with the driver, and when it started up young Conrad ran out to get on the roller. The machine started up, he tried to climb up behind and in some way was carried over the roller and down in front of it, and before Mr. Kemano, the driver, could stop the team, as it was on the down grade, it had passed clear over the little fellow, and crushed the last spark of life out of him. His neck was broken as he fell forward on his face, and his body was doubled right under the roller, weighing about a ton.

The driver was not to blame, as he could not see him get on, and it all happened so quickly the child was dead before anyone seemed to know that an accident had happened. The grade down the hill back of the school is quite steep, and the roller was one of the common variety without a brake of any kind. It was drawn by two horses, and many of the children, and two supervisors and Superintendent Tillinghast were all out to see the machine start. The little fellow has always been a very venturesome, active lad, and several times has met with accidents due to his enterprising spirit. Two years ago he fell from a balcony two stories high, and escaped with slight bruises. He has two sisters in the school, and his parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Hagen, at Canby. The body has been prepared by an undertaker and taken by Mr. Tillinghast to the afflicted parents on the afternoon train. It is but just to say that the accident was entirely free from any element of carelessness on the part of any employe, and is the first fatal accident that has ever happened at the school. The boy was well liked by all, and a very bright scholar.
