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AN OREGONIAN EDITORIAL THROWS A SIDELIGHT ON THE ACTION OF THE MARION COUNTY CONVENTION

Senator Bourne, our reports from Washington inform us, who has actively supported Senator Fulton's resolution authorizing the department of justice to prosecute suits FOR THE RECOVERY OF RAILROAD LAND-GRANTS, has written a letter to the attorney general, in which he expresses strong approbation of the position of the department. In resisting the proposed amendments to Senator Fulton's resolution; adding, however, that if the equities of innocent purchasers could be preserved by the amendment without jeopardy to the government's case such amendment should be incorporated. HE ASSURES THE DEPARTMENT IT CAN COUNT ON HIS SUPPORT IN FORCING THE RAILROADS TO COMPLY WITH THE TERMS OF THE GRANTS, AND STATES THAT HE WILL HELP SECURE SUCH SUBSEQUENT LEGISLATION AS WILL AFFORD EQUITABLE RELIEF TO PURCHASERS IN GOOD FAITH FROM THE GRANTEE COMPANIES.—Oregonian Editorial.

The above editorial should be brought home to every man calling himself a Republican, and he should realize that the day is past when a county convention even can be indifferent to a presiding officer who is a corporation agent.

IS IT ANY WONDER THAT THE REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION FAILED TO ENDORSE OUR DELEGATION IN WASHINGTON, FAILED TO ENDORSE OUR PRESIDENT, AND REFUSED TO CONSIDER A MOTION TO ENDORSE TAFT, WHEN THE PERMANENT CHAIRMAN WAS AN ATTORNEY OF THE HARRIMAN CORPORATION?

This is not a personal matter against the local attorneys of the Harriman system. It is a matter of subordinating a great political organization to the wishes of a corporation that is violating the laws.

No one will blame its attorneys for keeping down all expression of disapproval of its lawless policies in monopolizing the public lands AND HOLDING BACK THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE STATE IF THEY CAN DO IT.

And no one will blame the county delegates FOR SITTING DOWN ON THE MACHINE LEADERS who selected the corporation attorneys for chairman and managers of the convention.

Attorney Lou Adams of Silvertown was chosen for the temporary chairmanship of the Marion county Republican convention, but he was late in getting in, and Senator Kay was chosen.

KAY QUEERED THE PROGRAM which was to make an order of business providing for the nomination of

a legislative ticket bound hand and foot to corporation interests and a corporation program.

WHEN KAY STEPPED OUT AS TEMPORARY CHAIRMAN THE SLATED CHAIRMAN WAS PUT IN, BUT IT WAS TOO LATE TO RESTORE AND CARRY OUT THE MACHINE PROGRAM.

But Adams did prevent any endorsement of the present administration by having the platform committee bring in a blanket endorsement which mentioned Roosevelt as "last but not least."

CHAIRMAN ADAMS ALSO REFUSED TO PUT A MOTION TO ENDORSE TAFT FOR THE PRESIDENCY.

Thus a muzzled convention, fourth-fifths of whose delegates at heart are for Taft and at heart uphold Roosevelt, was made to bow down to the will of the Harriman agents.

The Oregonian paragraph contains the key to the whole situation. The Salem machine, WHICH HAD RECOMMENDED A HARRIMAN ATTORNEY FOR UNITED STATES DISTRICT ATTORNEY, does not uphold the present delegation in its fight to cancel the land grant that has been unlawfully withdrawn from the people.

No wonder these machine politicians who have allied themselves to the corporation interests did not want any open discussion of the issues of this campaign.

No wonder they are afraid to come out in the open where the people can see them and lay hands on them and call them to account. Their ways are dark and if they could have their way THE CORPORATIONS WOULD RUN THE REPUBLICAN PARTY INSTEAD OF THE PEOPLE.

No wonder they hate the direct primary and the direct election of senators. It means that their bargains to sell the rights of the people to the corporation cannot be ratified.

And on a show-down in the second ward only three men out of 22 were willing to stand for the corporation program.

OREGON VERSUS IDAHO DEBATE

Japanese Exclusion, a Live Question in Which the Whole United States is Interested. (Eugene Register.)

The third debate of the Triangular Debating league, in which the Universities of Oregon, Idaho and Washington compete for the northwest championship, will be held Thursday, March 26. On this night each institution meets the other two colleges and at the same hour debates the same question.

Oregon has two teams. The one taking the negative side of the question will debate Washington at Seattle, while the affirmative team will remain at home and meet the University of Idaho in Villard hall. Washington will meet Oregon in Seattle and send a team to Moscow to debate Idaho. Idaho meets Washington in Moscow and sends her negative team to Eugene. The winner is decided by counting each judges vote as one point. Oregon won the championship last year by defeating both Idaho and Washington and her two teams will fight like Trojans to repeat the stunt and retain her title.

The question to be debated this year is, "Resolved, That the present laws relating to the admission of Chinese immigrants to the territory of the United States should be extended to Japanese immigrants." This is a live question and the debate promises to be the most interesting. Whether or not the Japs should be excluded has been brought up in many parts of the country, hence we have something to look forward to for the argument next Thursday will be fast and furious.

The negative team going to Seattle is composed of Clarence Wheelton, '10, leader; Thos. Townsend, '09, and Sari Kilpatrick, '09. The affirmative team which will meet Idaho here is composed of Jesse Bond, '09, leader; Walter Eaton, '09, and Horton Nicholas, '10.

Manager Edgar Smith has arranged for a reception to be given under the auspices of the Laurean and Philologian Literary societies in honor of the two teams and of Bert Prescott, who won the intercollegiate oratorical contest at Monmouth last Saturday. The reception will be held at the dormitory reception room next Monday night. There will be speeches by the guests, music and refreshments. Manager Smith has also arranged for special cars to be run to the university Thursday night as there will be an immense crowd out to hear the debate.
