THOMAS A. EVANS LOSES HIS LIFE

Drowned in Long Tom Thursday While Driving Logs.
Elmira, Or., Mar. 20.—Thomas A. Evans, who lives eight miles west of here, was drowned near that place Thursday morning about 10 o'clock, while helping bring his drive of logs down to the Elmira lumber mills. The accident occurred within a half mile of the mill while breaking a jam.

Bert Inman and Ross Huston were about 50 yards above Evans around the bend in the creek. The jam had been broken and Evans was riding the logs down while the other men had taken the boat to pull in the loose logs from the bank. They heard a splash but as the trees overhung the river, they thought it was a limb that had caught in the flood. Then they heard a yell or what seemed like a yell, and they hailed to Hans Rude who was about 75 yards below where Evans went in and he answered. They asked if he was all right and he said yes. They supposed it was Evans and they went on with the work of pulling the logs in. A half hour later they went down the river to where Rude was and asked where Evans was. Rude replied that he had not seen him, then it dawned on them that the cry was from Evans and not Rude, and search for his body was at once begun. Ross Huston ran to the mill to give the alarm, a team with lumber to make a raft, and grappling hooks was dispatched to the scene and about 40 men gathered to hunt for the body. They found Evans' peavy where he had fallen in and at 2:30 p. m. the body was recovered about 75 yards below where it went in. The body was taken to Bert Inman's residence. It was found unnecessary to hold an inquest as the fact of his drowning being wholly accidental was fully established.

Thos. A. Evans was a well known and highly respected citizen of Elmira country and experienced in log driving. How he came to lose his life will, perhaps, forever remain a mystery.

Deceased was a brother-in-law of Z. T. Flisk, was 50 years old, and leaves a wife, a son aged 19 years and daughter aged 12 years. He carried an accident policy for an amount not known by our informants.

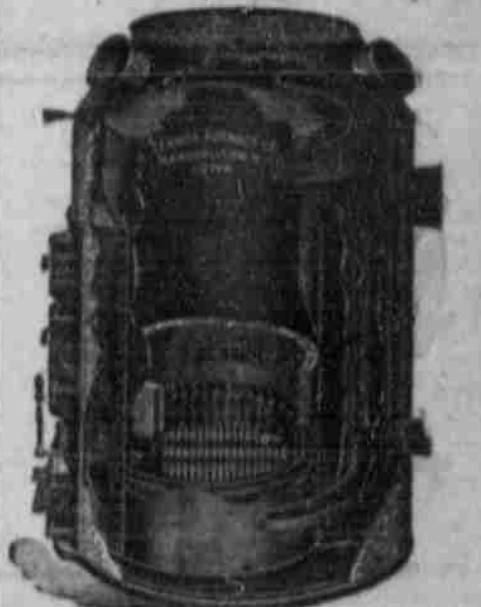
