ADMIRAL THOMAS HAPPY

Man Honored Who Has Borne the Brunt of the Hard Work of the Fleet.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Magdalena Bay, via San Diego, Cal., March 23.—Admiral Thomas, who will succeed to the command of the Atlantic fleet, upon its arrival at San Francisco, is a mighty happy man. The honor bestowed on him by the President, is, of course, intensely gratifying to him, but not much more so than the power it gives him to at least secure assistance in holding up the navy's end at the many functions arranged in honor of the fleet at the ports to be visited after the big fighting machines leave here.

Ever since the fleet left Hampton Roads it has fallen to Admiral Thomas' lot to represent the commander-in-chief at every function save one, and that was at Trinidad. At Rio, Punta Arenas, Callao and Lima banquets, receptions, ball, garden parties, bull fights and other entertainments were given, and at all of these Rear-Admiral Thomas had to take the place of the stricken Evans. When the fleet arrived here Thomas was, in the vernacular, "all in." Though strong physically, and a thorough lover of social events, the pace had been too hot for him, and he welcomed the respite that the long period of target practice held out to him.

Notice to Improve a Portion of High Street.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, held March 16, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve High street between the north line of State street and the south line of Court street, in the following manner:

First: By grading the roadway of said street between said points full width from curb to curb to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway Company with vitrified brick, in accordance with the plans and specifications for the proposed improvement of the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company on State street, the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the right of way of the said Oregon Electric Railway Company.

Third: By paving said roadway, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of said railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway Company, with Warren's Bitulithic water-proof pavement. The cost of said improvement to be assessed on the owners of adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days from the first publication of this notice.

WOODINGTON.—At the family home, near Silverton, Marion county, Oregon, Sunday morning, March 8, 1908, at 6 a. m., Albert Woodington, aged 76 years 5 months and 6 days. He was born in Indiana October 2, 1831.

In 1852 he was married to Elizabeth McMahan, who died three years later, leaving one son. In 1864 he was married to Sarah E. Magers, the oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dr. W. B. Magers, who were both well-known pioneers. Mr. Woodington survived by his wife, one son and four daughters: Mr. Charles Woodington, of Flora, Indiana; Miss Rosella Woodington, Mrs. Stella Lonon, of Salem, Ore.; Mrs. Daisy Shepherd, of Noble, Or., and Mrs. Lula Herman, of Molalla, Ore.

Mr. Woodington was recognized as one of Silverton's pioneers, having located here in the 50s.

The funeral was held Monday, March 9, at the Miller church, near Silverton. Services were rendered by Rev. Albyon Esson, and interment was made in the Miller cemetery, adjoining the church.

CRAIG—At the Willamette Sanitarium in Salem, Ore., at noon on March 21, 1908, Mrs. R. W. Craig, aged 31 years.

Deceased was the beloved wife of Robert W. Craig, the postmaster at Macleay, and member of the firm of Craig Bros., of that place. Besides her husband, she leaves a little son, aged about seven years. Her maiden name was Josie Taylor, and she was a member of the pioneer family of that name, of that neighborhood. She was a Christian woman of high character, and highly esteemed by all who knew her.

The funeral was held at Macleay, upon the arrival of her sister, Mrs. N. A. Bonn, of White Falls, Wash. Rev. P. S. Knight preached the funeral sermon.
