10. Marriage of a Catholic to a Protestant (one never baptised in the Catholic Church) before a minister or civil magistrate, will be no marriage at all, unless the Holy See makes a special law for the United States.

11. Marriage of a Protestant to a Protestant (provided they were never baptised in the Catholic Church) is valid.

12. Marriage of a Protestant (baptised) to a non-baptised party is no marriage at all.

13. Marriage of a non-baptised man to a non-baptised woman is valid as a lifelong contract. These parties do not receive, however, the Sacrament of Matrimony.

14. There will be no marriage at all unless there be two witnesses—one witness with the priest will not suffice.

15. Bishops or priests should not witness marriages until they are morally certain that the parties to be married are free to enter the matrimonial state, hence so far as possible dispensation from the publication of bans should not be sought.

16. For the lawful celebration of a marriage, one or the other of the contracting parties should have a domicile or live for a month in the parish where they are to be married. This condition is not, however, essential for the validity of a marriage.

17. Marriages of persons without fixed abode should be referred to the bishop before the ceremony takes place.

18. Marriage should take place in the parish church of the bride, unless there be good reason to go to the pastor of the groom.

19. There are new rules to be observed by the priest for the registration of marriages. When contracting parties are to be married in a church where they were not baptised, they should, when possible, before marriage secure their baptismal certificates.

20. Marriage entered into when there is danger of death, can be witnessed by any priest with two witnesses, provided there is not time to reach the bishop, parish priest, or priest appointed by either of these.

21. If for an entire month, parties cannot secure bishop, parish priest, or any priest appointed by either of these, they may in the presence of two witnesses (there is no marriage if there be not two witnesses) declare their consent to marry. They are then in the eyes of the church and before God married. As soon after the marriage as possible they should send their names to the parish priest for registration and do whatever is required to have their marriage legally recognized by the state.

POLK COUNTY OPINION.
Over in Polk county, where the Republican leaders have all accepted Statement No. 1, the Observer says: "The Republican convention held in Marion county to nominate or 'recommend' a county ticket, adjourned without taking such action. Senator Tom Kay poured some hot shot into the meeting when he declared that the direct primary law was enacted by Republicans, and warned the delegates that Republicans should not be the first to violate it. He pointed out the inconsistency of endorsing the law, and, at the same convention, violating its provisions. Such a course, he declared, would only cause friction and divide the Republican vote of the county. There were enough level-headed delegates like Senator Kay to carry the day, and the convention adjourned without putting out a ticket."

BOOSTERS WERE AT STAYTON

(Stayton Mail.)
Although it rained all day Saturday and continued through the night with a cold wind adding to the disagreeableness of the weather, the opera house was well filled with "boosters" and their freinds.

W. L. Freres, president of the Stayton Commercial Club, presided, and first called on W. H. Downing, president of the State Agricultural Association. Mr. Downing stated that seven miles of macadam road have been built in Sublimity precinct this year. He spoke strongly in favor of good roads as a means of building up our country.

F. G. Dekabach, president of the Salem Board of Trade, spoke of the interest the people of Salem have in an electric line up this valley, and said that Salem would raise \$10,000 for the proposition if necessary.

R. K. Page, manager of the Salem branch of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, declared that the country should be developed in order to secure a railroad. He spoke highly of Stayton's water power.

A. F. Hofer, secretary of the Salem Board of Trade, declared himself "a bashful boy," but nevertheless made a fine talk. He spoke of what has been accomplished in Salem by persistent effort, and suggested that Stayton might profit by Salem's example in the way of advertising. He showed that the interests of Stayton and Salem are identical, and that what benefited one helped the other.

Dr. Kitchen made a brief talk on what our town has accomplished thus far.

M. L. Jones, of Brooks, gave some of the results from berry raising in his neighborhood, and spoke highly of the dairy industry and also of a condensed milk factory.

Jos. H. Albert spoke on the feeling of interest existing between Stayton and Salem, and congratulated the people of Stayton on their progress. He spoke very nicely of the Stayton orchestra.

E. E. McKinney, of Sublimity, declared that he was a "booster," and was only sorry that he was not a younger man, so that he could get in and do a bigger share of boosting for the country.
