first of the month the receipts will far overtop the necessary amount.

This news is very gratifying to the boosters of Salem, as it means that their hard labor is beginning to bear fruit. Every day the number of visitors to this city and the communications from all parts of the country are on the increase. More especially are the number of home seekers and land and business buyers coming to Salem in increasing numbers. Not only are those coming to this city of the farming class; business men, in every line, are making it a point to visit here as the result of the steady boost, which is being continued with unabated ardor.

There arrived in this city this morning from Oakland the captain of the detective department of that city, W. J. Peterson. He is after a man who is wanted for a petty offense. He could just as well have sent one of the men under him, but he said to a Journal representative: "I heard so much about this state during the past month, that I took advantage of an opportunity to come here, and see if all they said about it was true. From what I have seen, it appears to be one of the best parts of this country." This from a captain of detectives of a large city, and who has been all over the United States only goes to illustrate what the work of the united boosters is accomplishing.
