

# MAYOR RODGERS VETOES

Mayor Rodgers has vetoed the ordinance fixing the liquor license at \$700. He says it is not stringent enough. Whether the council will override the veto remains to be seen, the contest being exceedingly close, there being just enough in favor of the bill, taking as a basis the last meeting, to pass it. But there are prospects of swinging just the one vote necessary to kill the ordinance.

The full wording of the veto message is as follows:

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Salem:

I return ordinance number 549 with my disapproval. This ordinance cuts the retail liquor license fee from \$1000 per year to \$700 without placing any additional safeguards or restrictions about the liquor business.

In the absence of reasonable restrictive measures, I believe in high license, but as a regulator only, and not as a means of public revenue. If saloons are permitted to run freely without let or hindrance, to suit the caprice of their owners, just so long as they pay their license, they become public menace and we gain nothing by high license save, perhaps, putting a few of the financially weaker ones out of business.

It is not right for any city to live off the saloons. I do not believe in surrendering control over the liquor traffic in exchange for revenue. This is the whole point of my contention. I believe, however, in holding to the \$100 license fee till we can hold the saloon. If the council will agree to a more stringent regulation of saloons by cutting out the privacy and other undesirable features of the business, I am willing that the license fee be materially reduced.

Fix it so no license will be given any man who has been convicted of a felony or who does not measure up to certain moral standards. Cut out the private back rooms and boxes. Eliminate women. Have the front blinds arranged so those who wish can see in. Make a drink to a drunken man work a forfeiture of license. Prohibit the second story annex. Limit the number of saloons. Insist upon decency, cleanliness and good order. Certainly no man worthy of a license is going to object to these things.

Can't we get together on this, gentlemen?

### BANNER COWS AT THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

(Corvallis Times.)  
An Ayrshire cow on the Oregon Agricultural College farm produced during her milk period of more than 10 months, just closed, 11,679 pounds of milk. It yielded 466.99 pounds of butter fat, equivalent to 544.47 pounds of butter. At an average of 30 cents per pound for butter, her milk yield brought \$163.34, exclusively of the skimmed product. The cost of her food was \$40, leaving a net profit of \$123.34. She was fed on green alfalfa and a very small ration of bran and rolled barley during the summer. In winter, her diet was 15 pounds of vetch and oat hay, 30 pounds of kale, and a grain ration of eight pounds of rolled barley and bran. She is six years old, and was purchased more than a year ago of Mrs. Honeyman, of Portland, whose farm is on the Columbia, to the north of Portland. Her cost was \$150, a concession having been made in the price because of the fact that she was for use at the college.

Another cow on the farm that is making a good record is a Holstein purchased at the same time the Ayrshire was bought, of P. A. Frakes, of Scappoose. Her milk record for last season was over 13,000 pounds, and her butter yield more than 520 pounds. She is fresh again, and is now giving 10 pounds of milk per

day. She receives the same ration that is fed to the Ayrshire, and her cost of keep is \$40 per year.

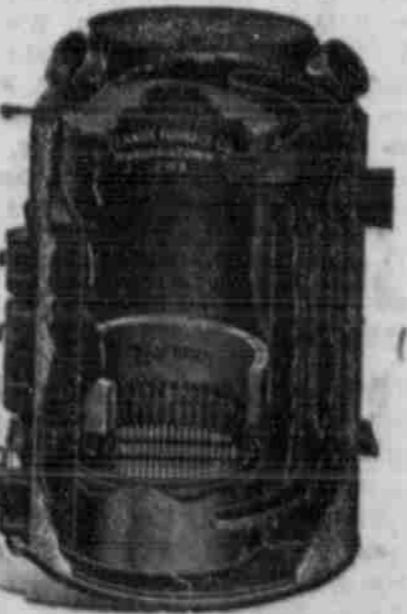
