Commenting upon the subject the Journal gives editorial expression as follows, which will undoubtedly find an echo in the mind of every right thinking person:
"I would not enter on my list of friends,

Though graced with polished man- ners and fine sense, Yet wanting sensibility, the man Who needlessly sets his foot upon a worm."
We believe that there has been a great improvement in boys in this respect during the past generation or two, but there is room for and need of still greater "growth of grace" in the heart of boys—and even in some men—in this regard. It should be a part of every boy's education, constantly instilled into him, that it is wrong, vicious, mean, despicable and not proper sport or fun at all, to kill, torture, wound or mistreat an animal. SALEM SCHOOL DIRECTORS

Take Prompt Action to Secure the Children Against Fire Danger.

Determined that no efforts will be spared to avoid a repetition of the recent Collinwood calamity, the school board, at its meeting Satur- day night, discussed the best means for fire protection in all of the schools, with the result that fire escape stairways are to be put in the Grant, Park and Lincoln school buildings. The East school has al- ready two stairways and these are regarded as sufficient protection.

Plans were discussed at the meet- ing for the beautifying of school grounds about the buildings and it was decided to distribute seeds to be planted by the pupils. This is in accordance with the ideas of the city and state superintendents of schools, who will soon begin sending out pamphlets to the schools throughout the state, in which it is recommen- ded that in addition to the regular Arbor Day suggestions, the pupils be taught to keep the grounds in scenic and beautifying condition the year around.

Mrs. M. G. Metzger, who has been teaching as a temporary instructor, was permanently appointed at the meeting last night.

SUPPOSED TO HAVE A LIKING FOR HORSES

Charley Wright, supposed to have a previous criminal reputation, was arrested Saturday night near Dallas on the charge of having stolen a horse from Charley Yattley Wednes- day night. He is now in the county jail awaiting hearing. His arrest is due to the commendatory work of Sheriff Culver and Sheriff Grant, of Polk county.

This helped along the investigation and it was soon found that Wright had come to Salem, and was about to be arrested, when he attempted to escape to Dallas, but was soon over- taken.

WORKERS FOR DIRECT ELECTION

The Carpenters' Union last Satur- day night, with almost a full house, enthusiastically endorsed Statement No. 1 as being the desire of the plain people, and as being a step toward the advancement of electing senators by the direct vote of the people. The resolution, endorsing the measure, carried with a shout, and if there were any dissenters, they were very quiet. The resolution is, as follows: "Resolved, That we regard sign- ing Statement No. 1 of the direct pri- mary law as a step in the direction of securing the election of senators by the direct vote of the people and will support no candidate for repre- sentative who does not sign such statement as provided by law."

A resolution was also passed at the meeting protesting against con- vict labor as resulting in unfair competition, the convict's no-pay op- posing the fair wages asked by labor. The resolution follows:

"Resolved, That we will support no candidate for representative who will not place himself on record as opposed to employment of convicts on public work of any description, with the exception of state highways. We regard the enactment of legis- lation providing for the employment of convicts on public buildings or grounds as inimical to organized labor."
