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SHALL THE PEOPLE OR THE MACHINE ELECT THE SENATOR?

It is a noticeable fact that this year all the candidates for the legislature are offering to vote for the people's choice. Some of them two years ago would not even vote for the Republicans who were chosen senator by the people. This year they offer to vote for THE REPUBLICAN PEOPLE'S CHOICE. That is some improvement. But who is to determine that matter? Are they to be left to form their own opinion as who the Republican people's choice is? How much more right have the Republican "people" to have a choice than any other class of "people"?

The Republican people have not always chosen wisely in the past.

THE REPUBLICAN PEOPLE ARE NO BETTER THAN ANY OTHER PEOPLE.

The bosses will say: That alleged Republican who got the popular vote was chosen by a mixture of people who registered as Republicans but were not real Simon-pure Republican people.

Their choice is not good. We want the real thing.

We cannot trust all kinds of horned cattle to vote for Republicans and none of these fellows are pure enough for us.

THEN IS ABOUT THE TIME THE DARK HORSE WITH THE BARREL WILL BE BROUGHT FORTH.

The truth of the matter is that a great many Republicans have not adopted the principle that the people are to choose the senator.

They say it's all right to let the people choose a senator by direct vote, BUT WHAT IF THEY SHOULD CHOOSE A DEMOCRAT?

That will not justify abandonment of the principle, and we would like to ask the Portland Oregonian point blank whether it favors the principle of electing senators by the direct vote of the people.

It can answer yes or no, and FOREVER SETTLE THE QUESTION OF ITS SINCERITY ON THAT MATTER.

If it favors the election of senators by the direct vote of the people it ought not seek to bring about the overthrow of Statement No. 1, because that statement is the only one that means the ratification of the direct vote of the people.

But it will not answer a direct question.

IT WILL EVADE AND QUIBBLE ABOUT THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES REQUIRING SENATORS TO BE CHOSEN BY THE LEGISLATURE.

Well, both people and legislature cannot choose senators.

One or the other must be secondary, and the people are never secondary to their representatives elected to do their will when it is understood.

We are glad this matter is coming to a square issue and the people will have to either vote the matter up or down and that in two ways.

If they prefer to have men go to the legislature who will under given circumstances refuse to elect the senator selected by the people, LET THEM SAY SO AND SEND UNSTRUCTURED REPRESENTATIVES.

If they want their own choice for the United States upheld let them send Statement No. 1 men, and put an end to all quibbling.

On top of Statement No. 1 already enacted by the people let them adopt the proposed initiative law, by which the general assembly as a whole, as

a body constituent of the state government, is DIRECTED TO ELECT THE CANDIDATE SELECTED BY THE people for United States senator.

That law is enacted by the people, and we believe it will be by an overwhelming vote, SHOULD END ALL QUIBBLING, ALL EVASION, AND ALL POLITICAL TRAP-PICKING in votes for the senatorship.

It is a plain issue—the people against the machine, and on this matter the people should not surrender their rights and power to the machine.

Do not allow the machine to have a single vote on the senatorship.

Go into the polling booth and elect the senator yourself, between yourself and your conscience and your God—and let no man's corrupt dollar intervene.

Remember this: The machine or the people will nominate and elect the members of the legislature, AND YOU HAVE GOT TO TAKE SIDES ON THE MATTER.

THE MACHINE WILL HAVE NO CONTROL WHATEVER OVER A STATEMENT NO. 1 REPUBLICAN.

As many members of the legislature as the machine can elect it will control and handle for its own purposes.

LINCOLN COUNTY FRUIT GROWERS HOLD SESSION

The fruit growers meeting at Elk City was well attended and was instructive.

Hon. Chas. A. Parks of the state board of horticulture was one of the speakers.

He said that while the state board had police powers and could cause neglected and diseased orchards to be cut down, yet they preferred to instruct the orchardists in the proper methods of fruit growing and induce them to give their orchards such care as would relieve the board from the necessity of resorting to arbitrary action.

In regard to the pruning of orchards he recommended the pruning of the trees in the spring to induce wood growth and in the summer to develop the fruit spurs. In grafting old trees, to avoid, the tall tops caused by grafting in the limbs of the trees, he advised the cutting off the trunk two or three feet above the ground and grafting until the new sprouts have grown and graft into them.

He favored the establishing of canneries for fruits and vegetables and said that the S. P. would give low rates in carrying fruit and vegetables from their stations to the canners.

FLYING FOR THE COAST

MURDERER LOCATED

AUTHOR OF SILVER LAKE CRIME

BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN LOCATED IN THE MOUNTAINS OF LANE COUNTY—POSSE IS ON HIS TRAIL FOR THE BIG REWARD THE STATE OFFERS.

Silver Lake, Or., March 24.—Out of provisions and afoot, Oille Hamilton, who is wanted at Silver Lake on the charge of murdering Julius Wallende last December, is struggling through the snow drifts of the mountains in a desperate endeavor to reach Western Oregon and the coast. He had abandoned his horse and his pack, and is now thought to be some where near the old military trail which leads into Lane county.

Word was received here yesterday that Governor Chamberlain had offered \$4000 reward for the capture of the murderer of Wallende. The citizens of Silver Lake have added \$500 to this sum. A posse is now at tempting to surround Hamilton and corner him in the mountains, where they feel confident, that they could soon starve him out, if they were not able to run him down.

Wallende was murdered last December. His body was not found until last week, when a note, mailed at Portland, Or., to the sheriff, told that official that the body could be found under the Silver Lake creek bridge. Search was made at that spot and the body found.

At the same time evidence was found which caused suspicion to be directed against Hamilton. A warrant was sworn out for his arrest, but before it could be served Hamilton was warned by friends, and he secured a cayuse and made a dash for the hills. A posse has been out for almost a week trailing him.

THOMAS AUTOCAR AT FRISCO

American Mobilists Lead All the World's Fastest Racers Across the Continent.

San Francisco, March 24.—Barring accidents, the American Thomas touring car, leading its nearest competitor by many miles in the New York-to-Paris race, will enter San Francisco about noon today, and may sail at 1 o'clock in the afternoon for the Orient.

San Francisco's prominent automobilists will greet the party at San Jose, and accompany it to the city. A. B. Watson, of the Automobile Club of California, is on the reception committee. A grand parade of cars has been planned in honor of the visitors.

When the Thomas car reached Gilroy, Cal., yesterday it was 800 miles ahead of its nearest competitor, the Italian car, which was reported near Ogden, Utah. The Thomas car is 555 miles ahead of the French car and is leading the German racer by 1179 miles.

According to the original program, the Thomas car was scheduled to leave San Francisco for Alaska, and thence by way of Siberia. A change in the route was announced last
