

GOVERNOR INVITED TO SEATTLE

Governor Chamberlain yesterday received a communication from the Seattle chamber of commerce, urging him to come to that city in June and welcome the fleet upon its arrival there. The letter, which follows, is signed by Josiah Collins, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce:

"Sir: Acting on behalf of the reception committee of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, and of the people of Seattle, I have the honor to extend to your excellency and to the citizens of your state a cordial invitation to be present in his city upon the arrival and during the visit of the battleship fleet of our navy. Secretary Metcalf, in response to the invitation of this chamber, has given assurance that the entire fleet will come here and will spend some time in these waters. The occasion will be historic for the entire Pacific Northwest. Citizens of the state of Washington are anxious for the official representatives and the residents of the sister states to join in welcoming the officers and men, who are participating in this memorable cruise of the navy, in which all have a patriotic pride. Owing to the fact that the schedule has not yet been prepared, it is impossible to name the exact date on which the reception program will begin. As soon as this is known, we will keep your excellency advised of the preparations in hand. Meanwhile, we trust you will plan to be present. The ships will arrive some time in June."

Governor Chamberlain today expressed himself as being desirous of complying with the request, but stated that it looked, at present, as if he would be unable to do so, owing to a number of important matters coming up at that time.

Notice to Improve a Portion of High Street.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, held March 16, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve High street between the north line of State street and the south line of Court street, in the following manner:

First: By grading the roadway of said street between said points full width from curb to curb to the proper subgrade.

Second: By paving the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway Company with vitrified brick, in accordance with the plans and specifications for the proposed improvement of the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company on State street, the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the right of way of the said Oregon Electric Railway Company.

Third: By paving said roadway, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of said railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway Company, with Warren's Bitumastic water-proof pavement. The cost of said improvement to be assessed on the owners of adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days from the first publication of this notice.

THE ILLS OF THE ACTOR

He Suffers Many at the Manager's Hands, but Commission Agents Are the Worst.

What is the case of the actor against the manager? I should like to tell about the sufferings inflicted upon players seeking engagements, the rudeness and brutality, the actual insults that are far too common, particularly to women; but these are personal matters for which there is no attempt at justification. Rather is my object to set forth abuses that have the sanction of custom, and that managers regard as necessary business details.

The actor doesn't object to paying a dramatic agent a commission amounting usually to half of a week's salary, under ordinary conditions. But he does object when a manager who has the player's address sends for him through an agent—and this is a common practice. And it is not unfamiliar for a manager to conduct all the negotiations himself, settle upon all the arrangements, and then direct all the members of a company to call at the office of an agent and sign the contracts. Actors believe that this is simply a scheme to share the commissions with the agent, and the external evidence supports their conclusion.—Hartley Davis in the March Everybody.

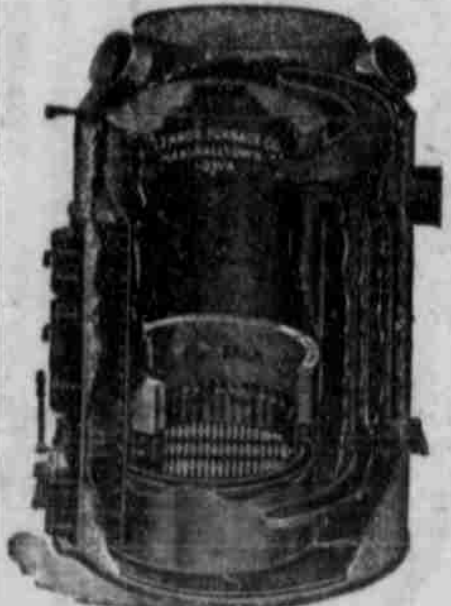
