INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM MEASURES TO VOTE ON—NO. 2

The second measure to be printed in the Journal, detailing the differences between the laws to be submitted to the people in June by the initiative referendum deals with a proposed amendment to the state constitution. It provides for an amendment of section 3 of article 14, of the constitution, by which state institutions may be located elsewhere than the state capitol. There are 19 measures in all to come before the people. The Journal will print one copy of each until all have been printed. The second measure printed dealing with the location of state institutions, will appear on the 31st as follows:
