TRI-CITY BASEBALL LEAGUE ORGANIZED

Excellent Line-up Will Be Formed for the Home Team.

Due to the excellent support and encouragement given by the Salem baseball fans, the Fairmount baseball aggregation of South Salem, are now in a fair way of placing an A No. 1 assortment of horsehide manipulators upon the four cornered turf for the coming season, and notwithstanding their respective sizes and experience, the youngsters declare that they will most willingly oblige any "take-in-camp" nine in the amateur class situated in any penetrable district in Oregon, providing their play grounds are moderately smooth and inclosed in order to assure convenience in playing and expenses required for such traveling as there may be, and those who desire to take advantage of this invitation, will receive immediate attention by addressing all correspondence to the manager, Mr. Otto Miller, here at Salem.

The line-up of the Fairmount team is somewhat the same as that of last year with the exception of a few new players. Daus will resume his former position as "the man in the box." This young twirler has the making of a splendid artist in the pitching line, and his work so far this season is much better than that of last year owing to his good control and quick-breaking curves which are so puzzling to the batter. Keeton will also hold down the center hole this season, and his remanor on the diamond during the few times he has been in action of late is the same as heretofore, although the smile, which always appears on his face at the proper time, is somewhat broader and encouraging, one of the best manners a pitcher can assume when in a bad predicament. Several other candidates for this position are in view, but only two out of the try-out, which will be held shortly, will be given the supervision of the box. In all probability, Frank Rhodes and Ray West will be selected for catchers, and a more capable backstop could hardly be picked up in this city, both men having extensive experience in this difficult position on various teams. Only one man has so far aspired for the first sack position, he being "Mike" Rasmussen, who was with the Fairmounts last year, although Welch is proving himself capable of holding down the No. 1 corner, but his work with the "big stock" is hardly up to that of Rasmussen's.

The place on second now lays between Clay Carey and Paul Raveaux, the latter named, held down several positions on the woolsen mill nine last season, and is a very fast player in most any part of the game to which he may be placed, while Carey played with Fairmount as shortstop and third baseman with fairly good success and he has a good batting average. Otto Miller will probably resume his old position on the nine as the third man around, while the man to stop the hot ones at short will be John Humphries. Evert Arnold is the only fielder to be named definitely, as several players are trying out for that position, among them being Roy Phillips, Fred Eugie and Will Daniels, all well known fly catchers.

The management of the Tri-City league players in this city, have given the Fairmount boys the first chance, or preference, of the league grounds here on Sundays, when not in use by the Tri-City players, thus enabling them to cover some of the expenses for the transportation of out-side teams who give return games to the Fairmount club.

Victory for Telephone Girl

A Salem special says: A decision by the supreme court gives Miss Frances McLeod, a stenographer of Marshfield, the right to continue her suit against the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company for \$1200 for failing to deliver a message to her. Judge Hamilton, and Attorneys F. W. Benson and John Hall met at Fort Orford on their way to Gold Beach to hold court last August. They discovered they would not have a stenographer and called long distance asking for Miss McLeod at Marshfield. The telephone operator, by accident, called a Mrs. McLeod, a nurse, to the telephone, and she in reply to Attorney Burton's question, "Can you take a case at Gold Beach," said "No, I have a case here now." The lawyers, by the peculiar equivocal use of the word "case," did not learn of the mistake and secured a stenographer from Roseburg. This substitute subsequently earned over \$1200 in fees, and it is the contents of Miss McLeod that she has lost this amount by the failure to call her to the phone. The telephone company, on the other hand, claims that if the parties calling for a number had been damaged, they would be entitled to recover, but that as Miss McLeod had not put in a call or paid any money, they were not responsible for any loss to her. The supreme court in its decision yesterday, overruled a non-suit granted by Judge Harris of Coos county, and ordered that the case be proceeded with.
