JAPAN GETTING EXCITED

OVER VISIT OF NAVY

MANY WILD RUMORS AFLOAT, BUT BEST ADVISED MEN UNDER THE MIKADO SEE ONLY FRIENDLY RELATIONS GROWING OUT OF VISIT—OTHER NEWS OF THE FLEET.

Tokyo, March 26.—The coming visit to Japanese waters of the American battleship fleet is causing many wild rumors, according to the Nishi Nishi Shimbun, but the newspaper states it is confident that when the visit actually is made, it will materially conduce to the future friendship and mutual interests of the two countries.

The Asahi Shimbun, one of the influential organs, reflecting official views, does not fear the American naval policy in the Pacific, but thinks that the traditional friendship of America and Japan will remain unshaken so long as their views are harmonious in respect to China, upon which country the general peace of the Far East depends.

GERMAN EMPEROR REBUKED

BY THE REICHSTAG

HIS PARLIAMENT CALLS HIM DOWN FOR HIS TRIVIAL OBJECTION TO ACCEPTING THE AMERICAN MINISTER—TOWER IS TRYING TO HANG ON TO THE OFFICE IN SPITE OF STRONG HINTS TO QUIT.

Berlin, March 26.—Emperor William is now threatened with a state "call down" from the reichstag as a result of his reported communication to President Roosevelt, in which objection was made to the appointment of David Jayne Hill as United States ambassador to Germany, to succeed Mr. Charlesman Tower, the present ambassador.

Members today declare that the reichstag will certainly take the matter up, as the Kaiser's action, if he did make objection, was neither constitutional or desirable.

The situation is badly muddled today. One version has it that Hill made himself objectionable to the emperor's family by an affront offered Prince Henry during the latter's visit to America. Another has it that the diplomat has become persona non grata to the German state department. Still a third has it that the real objection to Hill originated with Ambassador Tower, and that if officials at Washington are under the impression that either the Kaiser or the state department object to Hill, they have been misinformed. It is said that the note of objection to Hill was sent to Washington by Ambassador Tower, and not by the Kaiser.

The official denial given out today by the foreign office says: "Several months ago the German government was approached and expressed a favorable opinion of the expected appointment of Mr. Hill. Since then the subject has been unmentioned, and the government has never taken any official steps in the matter."

Washington, March 26.—Diplomatic and administrative circles here are astounded this afternoon at the official statement of the German government that no objection has been made in Berlin to the appointment of David Jayne Hill as ambassador to Berlin.

According to belief here, the objection was conveyed to President Roosevelt by Ambassador Tower, and the President was given to understand that by Tower that the note of objection came from the Kaiser direct. It is freely predicted here this afternoon that, should Tower fail to substantiate his statements, he will be ousted from the diplomatic corps at once.

It was stated today by a high official of the state department that, in response to repeated inquiries by Secretary Root, as to when he expected to retire, Ambassador Tower returned only evasive replies.

BENSON JOINS THE GOVERNOR

ON A FISH WARDEN

REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRAT UNITED TO REMOVE OFFICIAL AND NAMES HIS SUCCESSOR—STEEL STANDS FIRM TO THE LAST FOR BABCOCK BUT FINALLY YIELDS TO COMBINATION FOR NEW MAN.

Master Fish Warden Van Dusen was removed by the Fish Board last night, and after much wrangling and heated argument H. C. McAllister, of Portland, was selected in his place. Van Dusen's removal followed a hearing before the board, of his own seeking. His dismissal was unanimously decided upon by the board, and Governor Chamberlain will select an accountant to expert the fish warden's books before he is succeeded by McAllister on May 1.

Governor Chamberlain and Secretary of State Benson stood together unbiased for the selection of a successor, who would be absolutely neutral to both upper and lower Columbia river fishermen, but Treasurer Steele remained firm up to the last minute for the appointment of Chas. F. Babcock, of Oregon City.

After more than an hour's arguing, Steele, as he was about to leave the meeting before its conclusion, in order to take a train to Portland, gave in at the last moment, and agreed to the appointment of McAllister, thus making the selection unanimous. About 20 names were before the board, a great many of which were acceptable to Chamberlain and Benson, but Steele always stood out for the naming of an Oregon City man. The board stated for publication that the removal of Van Dusen was not intended to affect the two fish bills up for the initiative vote at the coming election.

INDIANA ENDORSES BRYAN

KERN FOR HIS MATE

CONDEMNNS VARIOUS FEATURES OF THE PRESENT ADMINISTRATION AND BOTH BANK BILLS NOW BEFORE CONGRESS—ILLINOIS CONVENTION HAS KIND WORDS FOR UNCLE JOE CANNON FOR HIGHER HONORS.

Indianapolis, March 26.—William Jennings Bryan was today endorsed for the presidential nomination by Indiana's Democracy in the state convention held here, and John W. Kern, one of the state's leading Democrats was the nominee for vice-president.

The platform adopted condemned the action of Secretary Cortelyou in issuing canal bonds in an effort to check the money panic, and for depositing government funds in New York banks. One plank disapproves of the efforts of President Roosevelt to dictate the negotiation of his successor, and another opposes the Aldrich and Fowler financial bills.

The delegates also voted to insert a plank declaring that Governor Hanly was incompetent to head the state government.

Stockton on the River.

Stockton, Cal., March 26.—Stockton has joined with the old cities in expressing a desire to have the fleet pay it a visit, but, unlike the other places, it will be satisfied with a call from the torpedo flotilla alone.

In case the invitation, which the chamber of commerce intends to send is accepted, the small fighting boats will enter Stockton through the San Joaquin river. The plan is to light up the harbor, and hold a grand reception for the officers and men, at a date that may be fixed later. If the boats cannot come, the officers will be asked to visit the city in launches.

Delay for Primaries.

San Francisco, March 26.—Realizing that the Atlantic fleet would be more of an attraction than the primaries to be held May 5, the general fleet reception committee has decided to wire to President Roosevelt the request of the Lincoln-Roosevelt League that Admiral Evans be ordered to delay his entrance into San Francisco until May 6.

Friends of good government have learned that it is hard enough to get the voters to the primary polls when there are no counter attractions. It is feared that, after the fleet arrives on the day scheduled, the good citizens will neglect their duty at the polls, and leave the machine element in control.

RAILROADS MUST GO OUT OF MINING.

Washington, March 26.—Attorney General Bonaparte today intimated that the Department of Justice will bring action against those railroads which have failed to divest themselves of their coal mining properties by May 1 next, under the provisions of the Hepburn bill.

Pressure had been brought to bear to persuade the President to have instituted merely a test suit, and considerable surprise was manifested today when the attorney general's intention became known.
