ROW WITH STUDENTS

Many More Students Have Been Let Out on Account of Demonstration Against Professor.

A few days ago 12 students were suspended at Stanford university on account of having took a leading part in a demonstration and parade against a professor by name of Clarke, who is supposed to have something to do with keeping order and discipline among the student body.

More Students Let Out. Wednesday 41 students were suspended. The student affairs committee refused to reconsider the cases of the 12 students originally suspended.

The announcement of the committee has created intense excitement and resulted in a demonstration against Professor Clark, chairman of the committee.

The hot-heads are talking of organizing a walk-out, but the more conservative students are advocating applications for leave of absence as a protest against the suspensions.

"Kenny" Fenton, captain of the Stanford university baseball team and one of the leading athletes in the Cardinal school is again prominent in university circles due to his outspoken advocacy of the "walk-out" policy in the controversy between the students and the student affairs committee at Stanford over the suspension of 12 students who were charged with being a part of a crowd of Stanford men who made a demonstration against the student affairs committee.

Fenton Made Speech. At a recent mass meeting of students Fenton made a speech, declaring that it was his belief that the only course left the undergraduates was to strike, and by this means compel the committee and President Jordan to take a more rational view of the situation than they apparently care to. So powerful was Fenton's appeal that it took the combined efforts of Coach Langsam and President of the Student Body A. A. Murphy to prevent an immediate walk-out.

Fight an Old One. The fight is an old one on the Stanford campus and was bitterly fought two years ago, when the then existing student affairs committee suspended B. S. Allen, editor of the Daily Palo Alto, because of his editorial criticism of the policy of the committee.

DISCUSSION OF STATEMENT NO. 1 Any discussion of Statement No. 1 that helps the people to better understand the situation is to be welcomed.

It is generally understood that Statement No. 1 IS A HELP TO GET AT A DIRECT ELECTION OF SENATORS BY THE VOTE OF THE PEOPLE.

If the people are to elect the United States senators, then any measure that makes their choice final and certain is in the right direction and to be supported by all who stand for that principle.

If Dr. W. A. Cusick is in favor of electing senators by the direct vote of the people, THE PEOPLE CAN HAVE NO DIFFERENCE WITH HIM.

If he denies that the people are capable to elect senators, then he has a right to contend for some other way of electing them.

For over 20 years the Republican party and Republican legislatures have been "rescuing" IN FAVOR OF DIRECT ELECTION OF SENATORS.

In an article in the Statesman Dr. Cusick made the following statement, CLEARLY STATING THE PRINCIPLE THAT A MAJORITY OF THE PEOPLE HAVE THE RIGHT TO NAME THE UNITED STATES SENATOR. The doctor used these words:

"The purpose of this article, however, is to show that a minority or plurality or anything short of a majority of all the votes cast, cannot be made to do duty, as the 'voice of the people, or choice of the people.' Candidates should find and declare themselves clearly in this matter. Then WHOEVER GETS A MAJORITY OF ALL THE VOTES, LET HIM BE ELECTED, as he is apt to be the best of the bunch, and full recognition will be given to the 'people's choice,' and majority rule."

Dr. Cusick inadvertently stated the truth in the above words, and what HE IN HIS HEART MUST FEEL IS RIGHT.

Realizing that he had inadvertently favored election by the people the other day in discussing the subject, Dr. W. A. Cusick in the Statesman Wednesday morning discusses the subject again. He says:

"Every member of the legislature, from Marion is and will be elected by a majority, and when they elect a United States senator he will, and can only be elected by a majority of both houses, and WHETHER HE BUYS VOTES OR NOT, HAS NOTHING TO DO WITH THIS DISCUSSION. He gets a majority or he is not elected. It is foolish to keep insisting on electing the United States senators by popular vote, because, at present it can't be done, as such proceeding would be in violation of our national constitution."

"WHETHER HE BUYS VOTES OR NOT," has everything to do with

the discussion. The people are tired of having members of the legislature sell their votes for federal offices or cash.

THE PEOPLE CAN CHOOSE BETTER MEN FOR SENATORS THAN MONEY CAN BUY.

In his first statement Dr. Cusick said: "WHOEVER GETS A MAJORITY OF ALL THE VOTES LET HIM BE ELECTED."

Now he says it does not matter, "WHETHER HE BUYS VOTES OR NOT."

Buyers them of who? Why of members of the legislature, of course.

You can only buy votes of those who have them for sale, and VOTES HAVE BEEN BOUGHT AND SOLD IN LEGISLATURES.

It is not believed that with the Oregon plan of direct nomination, and direct election, that senatorships can be bought any more than congressmanships, or governorships.

The people will not believe that Dr. Cusick means to say that a senatorship could be legally obtained in the legislature by purchasing votes.

DR. CUSICK IS NOT THE KIND OF A MAN TO SAY SUCH A THING, in the sense that he upholds purchase and sale of votes in the legislature.

But he has again revealed the very point that the people ARE SORE AFRAID TO TRUST THEIR REPRESENTATIVES UPON.

Statement No. 1 absolutely destroys the value of a man's vote in the legislature as a cash or political asset.
