COMMISSION TO CUT THE EXPRESS CHARGES

Suit to Compel the Portland Electric to Put Station at Alder Springs.
Express rates throughout the state may be reduced by the railroad commission shortly as the result of an investigation being carried on by that body at the present time.
Complaints have been received from various parts of the state from time to time claiming that the rates charged are exceptionally exorbitant, but as the railroad commission has been busy with other matters, they have been unable to make any investigation thus far. E. E. Miller, the commission's rate clerk, is engaged in gathering data and compiling comparative schedules. After this preliminary work is completed the commission will go very carefully to work and from present indications a big cut in the rates will be ordered.
The schedules in rates from other states, thus far secured, shows that the rates in Oregon are extremely excessive, and this tends to show discrimination, and it is on the claim of discrimination that the commission hopes to effect the reduction.
The railroad commission is in receipt of a communication from Chas. P. Church of Portland, which promises to wind up in the same litigation as that which is now pending before the circuit court here, wherein the towns of Milwaukee and Oak Grove are making a fight for lower rates.
Church, in his complaint, states that the Oregon Electric Railway company were made a present of 27 town lots in consideration of a promise that a convenient station would be put in at the Alder Springs addition to Portland and that a 5 cent rate would be inaugurated as well as commutation rates. This, Church states, the company has totally failed to do, charging a flat rate of 10 cents each way and having installed a station at a great distance from Alder Springs.
It is also claimed that Church sold a great deal of land to real estate dealers throughout Portland with the understanding that the 5 cent fare would immediately go into effect in addition to the commutation concessions promised. These real estate men, in turn, made many sales with the understanding, and now they have notified Church that, unless he secures the performances of the promises, he will be made a party to a damage suit against the railroad companies. The railroad company will be notified by the commission and after their answer has been received, a date will be set for the hearing.
The suit of the Travelers' Protective association against the Southern Pacific and other railroads in this state before the railroad commission to compel a cheaper issuance of mileage and better accommodations in regard to same, has been set for hearing before the commission on Monday, April 13th.
The railroad commission yesterday denied the petition of C. R. Aylsworth and S. P. Espenbain for a joint logging rate over the lines of the Northwestern Logging & Lumber company and the Portland Railway, Light & Power company into Portland.

BRITISH MUNICIPALITIES PROVIDING POWER

Consul Albert Halstead of Birmingham writes as follows in regard to the conduct of the electric light and power plant owned by that British industrial city:
The electrical supply committee of the Birmingham city council has been authorized to expend \$97,330 for the purchase of motors. The idea is to increase the use of electricity as a motive power among small manufacturers by permitting them to hire motors from the city for power purposes. This, I believe, is a new departure in municipal business activity. At the same time there has been a reduction of the scale of charges for electricity for power purposes.
Birmingham has expended several million dollars in erecting its modern electric power-houses. It furnishes electricity not only for lighting and power purposes, but for the electric streetcars, which the city also operates. An additional plant has to be provided at an estimate of \$1,125,548. There is friendly rivalry between the electric supply committee and the gas committee of the Birmingham city council for business each committee endeavoring to promote the use of its lighting and power facilities. The rivalry is keen, and it would seem as if it should be of advantage to both committees by leading to increase in the use of their supplies.

Notice to Improve a Portion of High Street.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, held March 16, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve High street between the north line of State street and the south line of Court street, in the following manner:
First: By grading the roadway of said street between said points full width from curb to curb to the proper subgrade.
Second: By paving the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of the Oregon Electric Railway Company with vitrified brick, in accordance with the plans and specifications for the proposed improvement of the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company on State street, the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the right of way of the said Oregon Electric Railway Company.
Third: By paving said roadway, save and except the space between the rails and one and one-half feet outside of the rails of said railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway Company, with Warren's Bitulithic water-proof pavement. The cost of said improvement to be assessed on the owners of adjacent property, as provided in the charter of said city.
Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed within 20 days from the first publication of this notice.

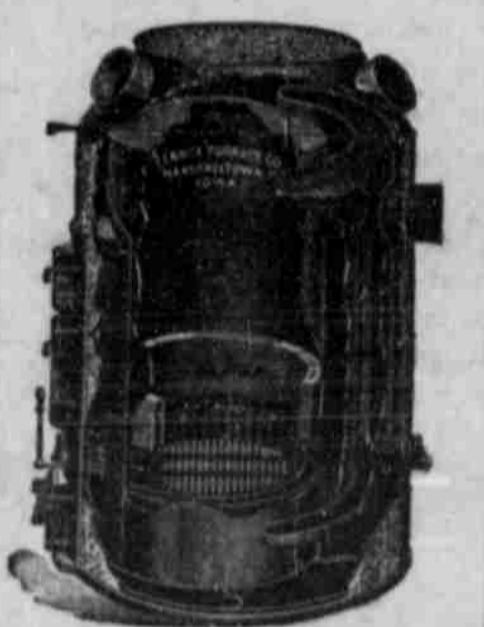
