NORMAL SCHOOL REPORT

The State Normal School Board has received reports from Weston and Monmouth for the month ending March 20, and shows the following: Monmouth had 156 students enrolled, and remitted \$2965 fees for tuition and use of dormitories. Weston had 198 students and remitted \$2040 fees, etc. The board ordered a uniform graduating diploma for all the schools, 480 copies, of the state printer, enough to last two years, for about \$10. Some of these schools in the past have used parchment diplomas, at \$1.50 per student. Monmouth and Ashtland were authorized to hold summer normals for six weeks, under direction of the president of the respective schools, and president to report faculty to board. President Reasler, of Monmouth, was given six weeks leave of absence to visit New York state normal and the best institutions in several of the Eastern states.

TWO SETS ARE NOW LINED UP

Statement No. 1 Men Complete Their Legislative Ticket—Antis Are Also Trying to Keep Down Number of Aspirants.

Walter C. Winslow, the young Republican who entered his protest against the Republican county convention putting up a ticket, has filed his petition as a candidate for representative on Statement No. 1, and thus completed the ticket of aspirants who will go before the people standing for that principle in Marion county. Mr. Winslow was waited upon by a committee of the Carpenters' Union, who requested him to enter the race and stand for direct election by the people. He is the fifth man to file for the Statement, and will, with the rest of the five, make a campaign of the county for nomination.

The Statement No. 1 representatives will ask the people to vote for their nomination on a square issue against returning to the old way of choosing United States senators, that issue having been raised by the Republican machine politicians at Portland and against which the people protest.

The People's Choice Ticket.

Hal D. Patton, booster, bookseller and flag raiser at Salem.
Henry J. Miller, hop buyer and business man, at Aurora.
O. L. Hatteberg, farmer and banker, at Silverton.
A. C. Libby, farmer and grainger, at Jefferson.

Walter C. Winslow, law student and referee in athletic sports, Willamette University.

These men are all staunch Republicans and supporters of the policies of the Roosevelt administration the primary law and selection of United States senators by the direct vote of the people. They ask to be voted for upon their principles, and not on account of any personal ambitions for office, and preferring defeat to any compromise of the principles for which they stand.

Republican People's Choice.

The candidates who are now in public choice" or the "choice of Frank Turner and Sam Hughes, of Salem; W. L. Simeral, of Macleay; S. D. Adkins, Scotts Mills, C. M. Crittenden, of Hubbard; Lloyd T. Reynolds, of Chemawa. Efforts are being made to secure the withdrawal of Mr. Hughes as the anti-Statement No. 1 candidates wish to have only five men in the field. They are all agreed in signing a statement pledging themselves to vote for the "Republican choice" or the "choice of the Republican party," or the "choice of the Republican voters," for United States senator. These pledges are neither Statement No. 1, nor Statement No. 2, as contained in the law, and mean the choice of a Republican state convention of the Republicans in legislative caucus. There is some difference of opinion as to what the pledges do mean among those who are supporting the proposition, but they all agree in opposing Statement No. 1.

The Statement No. 1 candidates say they have no fear but what the people will elect a Republican legislature and a Republican senator in June. The Republican-people's choice men fear the people may elect a Democrat for senator, and they want the legislature to elect a Republican senator.

Who Are the Antis?

The Anti-Statement candidates are all good men, so far as known to the Capital Journal. Frank Turner is the well-known lawyer, of this city, who has held office in Iowa and Oregon, and has served as desk clerk in the legislature. He is a very competent man. Lloyd Reynolds served a term in the last legislature, and is a progressive fruit grower. Sam Hughes was a Statement No. 1 candidate two years ago for the nomination, and is a well-known contractor. W. L. Simeral, of Macleay, has for years been farmer at the reform school, and is well-known at Salem. Adkins and Crittenden are new men in politics in this county, but well spoken of. For these gentlemen The Capital Journal has the highest regards, and, while they differ with us on a vital principle of the primary law, this paper will express only good will toward them in the primary contest, and will support them heartily if they are the Republican nominees for representative.

ARMOR PLATE FRAUDS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 26—Charges that have been concerning the position of the armor plate of all the ships of the Atlantic fleet are held to be groundless in a report on the subject submitted to the secretary of the navy by Admiral Evans.

The report says that when the vessels arrived at Magdalena bay the armor belts were several inches higher than when the vessels left Hampton Roads. Admiral Evans insists that there is nothing irregular about this because the ships were coal laden to the limit when they left for the south, but that they would not have been so laden were they going into action.

Reds Run Out of Frisco.

San Francisco, March 26.—Determined to chase every "red" out of San Francisco before the arrival of the fleet, the police are today awaiting word from federal officers at New York, Boston and New Orleans, in the hope of making an object lesson of Paul Bignami, the self-styled "King of the San Francisco anarchists," arrested yesterday. They hope to be able to deport him.

Despite his wild statements prior to his arrest, and the alleged threats of destruction of the fleet and death to President Roosevelt, the local officers do not regard Bignami as a man apt to resort to violence himself. He is loud-mouthed, however, and is undoubtedly an agitator. They fear that if allowed to continue their harangues, he and others of his ilk, may stir up some of the weaker-minded radicals and cause trouble.

Every known "red" in San Francisco will be kept under strict surveillance for the next few weeks, and any who become demonstrative will face deportation.

CHICAGO WATER GRAFTS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, March 26.—Sensational disclosures of alleged wholesale thefts and graft in the water bureau by city employes today led to a shake-up in the bureau and a complete reorganization. Thefts of tools, meters and materials furnished the workmen, which were pawned or sold by employes, were conditions said to have been disclosed to Superintendent McCourt.

Another result of the revelations was the rendering of a bill for \$27,592 against the Chicago Union Traction Company, the amount representing city water used in five years by the company and unpaid for. The city was defrauded of this amount, it is alleged, with the connivance of city employes.

Entering the rear door of the boarding house, Enright shot his sister-in-law whom he encountered in the kitchen and then meeting wife in the hallway, pressed his revolver against her back and shot. As she fell fatally wounded, Enright turned the weapon on himself.
