MATTERS DECIDED BY JUDGE GALLOWAY Judge Galloway today denied the petition of P. Anderson to appoint a receiver for the butcher shop of F. A. Kurtz. It was claimed by Anderson that he was a partner of Kurtz and that the latter had overdrawn his share \$1100, but during the hearing of the case, testimony was introduced showing Anderson had no interest, other than as an employe in the business. Judge Galloway also rendered a decision cancelling a deed given by John Wesley Vaughan to Charles A. Bear for a valuable strip of property in the eastern part of the county on the ground that Vaughan, who is a very old man, was of unsound mind at the time of making the deed. The suit was begun July 29 of last year by Pierce Parker, as guardian of the old man, who was represented by Attorney F. A. Turner, while Bears secured the services of Carey F. Martin. The case has been under advisement for sometime. Judge Galloway this morning sustained the demurrer to the answer in the injunction suit brought by J. L. Freeland against the city to prevent the street commissioner from opening up Pine street through his property. The case will now proceed to be heard in due order.

commerce in favor of the state, and the question of state rights present such a complicated problem to the legislative body in connection with the proposed bill to restrict interstate traffic in liquor that is today declared unlikely any action will be taken at this session. Senator Raynor, who is a member of the sub-committee on the committee on judiciary to which this bill was referred, is quoted as saying that it is utterly impossible to enact the legislation contemplated, with the bill in its present shape. There is a strong disinclination on the part of congress to consider this, or any other bill, bearing on prohibition. With the elections coming due this fall legislators are disposed to fight shy of the entire subject. Representatives from the south who have a solid prohibition constituency behind them are clamoring loudly for consideration, but the leaders in both senate and house have decided not to permit a vote if they can circumvent it. Senator Raynor sums up the situation from its legal aspect as follows:

"I have come to the conclusion that while we might enact legislation that would prevent the execution of a contract where it is intended to sell the liquor, and we might also pass a law to prevent its delivery to drunkards and minors and other persons prohibited by the states from receiving the same, there is no way in which we can give the states a bona fide contract between the consigner in one state and the consignee in another, which contract the supreme court has said arises under the constitution, and can only be perfected by delivery."

To Push Aldrich Bill. Washington, Mar. 28.—The Aldrich financial bill which had such smooth sailing through the senate yesterday, being passed by a vote of 42 to 16, will be referred to the house committee on banking and currency, it is understood, today.

Too Much Applause. Washington, Mar. 28.—"Who put 42 'applauses' in the congressional record's report of his speech is a question being asked to by Representative Edwards of Georgia. Edwards spoke for just one minute in the house the other day on the bill to restore to the coin of the United States the motto "In God We Trust." The he got permission to "extend his remarks" in the record. When the several thousand words which he turned into the public printer appeared in print he was astonished to learn that 42 times his unuttered eloquence had brought forth "applause."
