INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM MEASURES TO VOTE ON—NO. 3 & 4

The third in the list of 19 initiative and referendum measures to be before the people in June deals with a proposed amendment to the constitution by which it is proposed to increase the number of justices of the state supreme court from three to five, and further regulate the jurisdiction of the circuit and county courts.
At the last session of the legislature immediate provision was made for the increase of the supreme court by enactment of a law authorizing the appointment by the governor of two supreme court commissioners who were to sit in effect as associates to the justices of the supreme court. In accordance with this law, R. Kling of Ontario and W. T. H. H. of Salem were appointed, and are now serving.
The next measure is No. 4.
The fourth of the series of 19 initiative and referendum measures to be before the people in June, is a proposed amendment to the constitution of the state changing the time of the regular biennial elections from the first Monday in June to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The purpose of the amendment is to do away with the necessity and expense of holding elections in presidential years, in the present year when the state is to have a general election in June and a presidential election in November. The appearance of the amendment on the ballot will be as follows:
Referred to the people by the legislature assembly—For amendment section 14 of article II of the constitution changing the time of holding the regular general biennial elections from the first Monday in June to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. Vote yes or no. 364 yes; 367 no.

The amendment was originated as a house joint resolution and being adopted by both houses at the last session of the legislature, was referred to the people according to law. The resolution as it passed was as follows:
House joint resolution No. 7—Proposing amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon. Resolved by the house, the senate concurring:
That the following amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon be, and the same is hereby proposed:
Section 14 of article II of the constitution of the state of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows:
Section 14—The regular general biennial election in Oregon for the year A. D. 1910 and thereafter shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. All officers except the governor, elected for a six-year term in 1904 or for a four-year term in 1906, or for a two-year term in 1908, shall continue to hold their respective offices until the first Monday in January, 1911; and all officers, except the governor, elected at any regular general biennial election after the adoption of this amendment, shall assume the duties of their respective offices on the first Monday in January following such election. All laws pertaining to the nomination of candidates, registration of voters and all other things incident to the holding of the regular biennial election shall be enforced and be effected the same number of days before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November that they have heretofore been before the first Monday in June biennially, except as may hereafter be provided by law.
