### AN OPEN LETTER

Don't Swap Horses In the Middle of a Stream.

Hon. Jonathan Bourne, Jr., U. S. S.

Sir:—The first legislators of the United States were wise in providing for the election of a President without limit as to the number of terms an executive might serve.

When a man has proved his ability to fill the executive office wisely and well the people should be allowed to re-elect him, and they are so allowed by the constitution of the United States.

Opponents to the election of General Grant for a third term cited the fact of Washington's declination of a third term; but if a war had been imminent at the close of Washington's second administration, he would have been the one to be chosen for the succeeding term, and he would, undoubtedly, have accepted, seeing his duty to the nation. But no such emergency existed, and Washington was glad of an opportunity to enjoy rest at Mount Vernon.

There was no emergency calling for the election of General Grant for a third term, and his party declined to give him another nomination.

In the midst of the civil war the Republican party saw clearly that Abraham Lincoln was the logical candidate for a second term, and it kept him in office that he might complete the great achievement he had so wisely conducted during his first term. But supposed that Lincoln had lived until the end of his second term, and that the war had not then been ended, how unwise it would have been not to select him for another term.

The people of the United States are the rulers. It is for them to judge who is best fitted to fill the executive office, and if they wish a president to succeed himself it his duty to obey their will.

It is objected to the privilege given by the constitution to the people to re-elect a president for unlimited terms, that a president may use the strength of the government to secure his re-election; but, if a president attempts so to use the opportunity of his position, the people will be quick to know it, and, therefore, no danger lies in that direction.

At the present time the people of the United States face the great question whether they shall consent to the declination of President Roosevelt, or whether they shall insist upon his serving another term to complete the great work he has begun.

Three times in the history of this nation great leaders have appeared, as if sent by providence, to lead us to victory in great emergencies, when the life of the nation and the success of Democracy was in jeopardy. Washington led the nation to victory in the Revolution; Lincoln led us to victory in the Civil war, and Roosevelt is leading in the great warfare now going on between the common people and plutocracy.

We confront today an emergency not less threatening than was the Civil war. Wealth and greed and graft aim to control the government. Shall we insist that the President

shall continue to be our leader in this great struggle until victory is won, or shall we swap horses in the middle of the stream? The ford is deep and the current is strong, and we need a master hand at the bit to guide us to the shore.

Theodore Roosevelt has shown himself to be such a master hand. Shall we exchange such an one for another in so critical an hour?

How such an act on the part of the people would gratify the trusts and the grafters and the financial "kings"! They would have controlled legislation and forged chains about the nation for years, and Mr. Roosevelt is the first to defy them and to seek fearlessly, to destroy their power for evil. He has been a guide and leader of the republic in this critical hour, like Washington in the Revolution, and Lincoln in the Civil war. But the war is not yet won. Plutocracy, the enemy of the people, wants anyone but Mr. Roosevelt in the executive office. It subsidizes the press; it controls elections; it strives in every way that money can accomplish to prevent his election.

Shall we gratify its wish? Shall we change our leader? Shall we entrust the conduct of this great undertaking to another? Shall we swap horses in the middle of the stream?

With Theodore Roosevelt in the presidential chair another four years the overweening power of wealth and greed would be overcome. Through his influence our laws would be so framed that plutocracy would be helpless for harm and the people would be triumphant.

Stand by, Senator Bourne, and your prediction will yet be verified. Hold up the President's hands. Cause him to see that by accepting a second elective term he does not become a Caesar, but a dutiful servant of the people.

The esoteric wish of the people is with you, and when the fateful hour comes, and the wish is realized, the people will rejoice, and you will be honored for your loyalty to your conviction. J. B. MARVIN.
