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### THE MARION COUNTY STATEMENT NO. 1 TICKET.

Do our readers fully realize what it means to have this ticket nominated and elected?

In the first place no one questions but what THAT TICKET WILL BE ELECTED IF IT IS NOMINATED.

It is very doubtful if men of any party can be found to run against Statement No. 1 ticket if it ratified at the primary election on April 17.

This is not because Democrats want to help Republicans but because there is a VAST MAJORITY OF PEOPLE OF BOTH PARTIES WHO WANT TO TAKE THE SELECTION OF UNITED STATES SENATORS ENTIRELY OUT OF THE HANDS OF THE LEGISLATURE.

But there is a greater principle involved within the Republican party itself.

It is a well-known fact that the so-called leaders in the party at Portland and over the state deliberately started out to make the legislative tickets themselves in old-fashioned conventions.

That was the plan in Marion county, and it DID NOT FAIL FOR LACK OF INTENTION ON THE PART OF THE MACHINE LEADERS.

It failed because there was too much sentiment among the rank and file against the proposition.

On a show-down in a convention called by the machine leaders, and composed of delegates largely of their own selection, THREE OUT OF FOUR REPUBLICANS IN MARION COUNTY WERE OPPOSED TO A RETURN TO THE OLD METHODS OF MAKING UP A LEGISLATIVE TICKET.

The number who believe in returning to the old convention ways is very small and growing smaller.

The bloody scenes enacted in the Republican and Democratic conventions held this year in Illinois, Tennessee, Indiana, Kentucky and other states brand the convention system as having outlived its usefulness.

The Statement No. 1 ticket for the legislature in this county has been put up IN SPITE OF THE THREAT OF THE LEADERS TO KNIFE SUCH A TICKET.

It can be said without fear of contradiction that most of those leaders voted for John M. Gearin in 1906, and they are the ones who shriek loudest about Statement No. 1 men favoring Chamberlain.

There is no evidence that Statement No. 1 men will not at the primary and in the election vote for

the Republican nominees for U. S. senator

Therefore the support of Statement No. 1 candidates at the primary and at the ensuing election BECOMES THE HIGHEST DUTY OF REPUBLICANS.

The people have a right to demand that candidates for the legislature shall pledge themselves to vote for the choice of the people.

The Oregonian nor any Statement No. 1 leader will go on record as saying that he is opposed to electing senators by the direct vote of the people.

THEY ARE UNWILLING, HOWEVER, THAT THE PEOPLE SHALL CHOOSE THE SENATORS OR THEY WOULD NOT BE AFRAID TO HAVE A CANDIDATE TAKE STATEMENT NO. 1.

There can be no possible objection to Statement No. 1 men on the ground of their upholding the laws on the subject of electing senators.

They are all five of them clean men, upholding clean principles, AND APPEALING TO THE CLEAN CITIZENSHIP FOR SUPPORT.

They cannot be accused of having selfish motives beyond wanting to be elected to the legislature which is every man's right.

A Statement No. 1 man cannot trade his vote for any office or for any commissions, or real estate or anything else, BECAUSE HE DELIVERS IT IN ADVANCE TO THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE.

A Statement No. 1 man cannot enter into any deals to hold up the legislature or trade his vote on senator for appropriations.

He has burned the bridges behind him. He stands for a clean ticket, for the American flag and majority rule.

### MORE HOME-SEEKERS THAN SINCE YEARS

What a Prominent Salem Real Estate Firm, Who Advertise in This Paper, Has To Say.

The results of the boosting being every mail enquiries as to land, and a remarkable degree by the real estate firms, all of whom claim to have had more Eastern home-seekers, principally from Kansas, at their offices during the past week than ever before.

J. W. Wilson, of the firm of Derby & Wilson, gave out the following mighty encouraging statement to a "Journal" representative this morning:

"The number of Easterners in this town at the present is remarkable. There are five strangers with money to buy farms here every day now where there was only one every two or three days last year. This is doubly astounding considering the present financial distresses in the East and through the United States generally, when money for buying land is very scarce.

"I have done more business with people coming from other states during the past two or three weeks than I have ever done before in four times that period during the seven years I have been in this city.

As the result of the good boosting being put forth by Salem at the present time, I am receiving by every mail enquiries as to land, and this morning I received two letters, one from Missouri and the other from Kansas, asking for specific descriptions of property for sale, one of the enquirers having \$3500 he desires to invest here, and the other about \$2000. I am working just as hard as I can every day of the week and I would never have thought the boosting could have brought the stupendous results it has.

I now enclose Salem circulars with every letter I send out, whether it be personal or business.

Practically the same story was told the "Journal" reporter in all the real estate offices. Ellis & Wood report they have had more business with strangers during the past few days than in any three weeks before. While Mr. Ellis was discussing the remarkable influx of easterners with The Journal reporter, J. L. Freeland, a furniture dealer, broke into the conversation that he, too, had had more Eastern people in his store getting ready to outfit their homes as soon as they could buy land than he had ever had before. This kind of letter means much to Salem; this particular man brings with him several thousand dollars to invest in property here. Every day letters of this kind are received by the board of trade.

It is expected that when spring proper begins there will be an influx, the like of which has never occurred before. The men, whom the board of trade and boosters, generally, have reached are men with money to invest in lands, but many letters have been received from skilled artisans, such as electricians, civil engineers and skilled laborers of all kinds, who are desirous of locating and building their homes here.

Anticipating the rush of home-seekers and builders, the real estate men will meet at the board of trade room at 7 o'clock tonight for the purpose of forming a real estate board, which will facilitate the selling of properties to the incomers and seeing that they get properly located. Many Portland real estate men will be present at the meeting and are anxious to assist in the organization of the new commercial body.
