GOULD FAMILY ARE FIRM

POOR WOMAN WHO GOT RID OF ONE COUNT HAS TROUBLES GETTING ANOTHER—FAMILY WILL NEVER SANCTION HER MARRIAGE TO THE PRINCE—FORMER HUSBAND STILL HOPES FOR RECONCILIATION.

 New York, March 31.—Madam Anna Gould, in the seclusion of magnificent apartments in the St. Regis hotel, is today on the verge of a nervous breakdown following an exciting conference held by members of the Gould family which was abruptly ended by the stamp of disapproval being placed on her plans to wed Prince de Sagan.
 The former countess had evidently anticipated the action her brothers George and Edwin, and sister, Helen Gould, would take in the matter, for before she entered into the conference with them she made arrangements to engage a suite of rooms at the St. Regis. She had been residing with her sister since she returned from France, but as soon as the other members of her family issued their ultimatum in the De Sagan affair she immediately went to the hotel.

Physicians under whose care she has placed herself are today denying all her friends admittance to the apartments. While Mme. Gould's condition is not necessarily critical, her physicians admitted that her nerves are so completely unstrung that she required constant medical attention.
 Following a quarrel with members of her family over Prince de Sagan, whom she will soon marry, according to gossip, Mme. Anna Gould made arrangement to leave the home of her sister, Helen Gould, and take apartments at the St. Regis hotel.

What is said to have been the final conference of the Gould family to discuss the relations of Anna Gould and the cousin of her former husband, Count de Castellane, was held last night and ended in a disagreement, with George, Edwin and Helen all arrayed against Anna. The conference is said to have ended when they told the former countess that they would never sanction her marriage to the prince.

Paris, March 31.—Count Boni de Castellane is carefully abstaining from all comment, in conversation with his friends, to Prince Helle de Sagan's presence in America. His silence is a continuation of his policy to avoid annoying his former wife in any way. Of his continued fondness for her there is no doubt and the general opinion is that, despite Helle's energetic wooing, the count still hopes for a reconciliation.

Fulton Opens Battle.
 Medford, Or., March 31.—Senator Charles W. Fulton, in the opening speech of his campaign for re-election for the United States senate, denounced the accusations made by Francis J. Heney as being based upon falsehood, and read an affidavit signed by James F. Powell of Albany, Oregon, which refuted the accusations of bribery made by James S. Smith.

Mr. Fulton also defined his position on Statement No. 1. He stated that he favored the election of senators by the people, but did not consider it his province to attempt to dictate to candidates for the legislature the position they should take on the question.
 Salem Democrats Banquet.
 On April 1, the Salem Jefferson club will give a banquet at Willamette hotel in commemoration of the birth of Thomas Jefferson. They are planning the most elaborate banquet of its kind ever held in Salem. A large attendance of local Democrats

and distinguished visitors is expected.

A committee is at work on the program, which is not fully completed yet. Among those who have been secured for responses to toasts are Governor Chamberlain, ex-Senator John M. Gearin, F. V. Holman, Wm. Kaiser, F. S. Senn and John Manning.

GUBAN COMMERCE OPPOSES QUARANTINE

Havana, March 31.—Commercial interests and the people in general are hoping that the American quarantine against Cuba, scheduled to become effective tomorrow, will not be established and that the authorities at Washington will listen to the many protests that have been made against it.
 One of the strong points against the establishment of it is that it would be in violation of the convention between the Latin American republics and the United States which provides that a quarantine shall not be established unless yellow fever is reported within five days of the sailing of a vessel. It is also pointed out that such a move would ruin the tourist traffic for the coming carnival and interfere with commercial affairs. It is the opinion of the health authorities that there is no good reason for an early re-establishment of the quarantine.
